EASTERN OREGON HORSE SCHOOL IS IDEA OF O. A. C.

IF SUFFICIENT INTEREST IS AROUSED INSTITUTION WILL BE LOCATED IN PENDLETON.

A horse school for eastern Oregon to be held in Pendleton in the early spring months is the plan of the extension department of the Oregon Agricultural College if there is enough local interest in such an undertaking.

Carl N. Kennedy, assistant professor of animal husbandry at O. A. C., has written the Commercial association asking for the sentiment of local people regarding such a school, and he has also written Dr. C. W. Lassen, veterinary, and Horace Metz, well known importer of stallions.

Pendleton is the first choice of the college for the location of such a school, Prof. Kennedy writes, because this city is the center of the eastern Oregon horse market. The only local requirements would be the furnishing of suitable grounds, the providing of a limited number of animals for demonstration purposes and a general interest among horse owners.

The proposed course would deal with horse anatomy, dissection, artificial impregnation, horse judging, horse breeding and horse feeding. Only authorities especially competent would be sent up to conduct the school.
