PARDONS SET FREE TWO LIFE TERMERS

One Has Served Forty-four Years, the Other Thirty, Convicted as Murderers. HARTFORD, Conn., Dec. 19.—After almost forty-five years in the state prison, Michael Cherest, under life sentence for murder, will leave tomorrow a free man. His petition for a pardon and that of another murderer,

John F. Kennedy, alone of forty-six, were favorably considered at today's meeting of the board of pardons. Cherest broke down and wept when he was told of the board's vote. He is a Canadian, and was sentenced May 13, 1872, after his conviction of killing an innkeeper in Granby during a New Year's orgy. Davis Scott, associated with him in the act, is dead, and are all the grand jurors and trial jurors. Cherest will be cared for by a friend in Massachusetts. Kennedy killed his wife with an ax in their New London cabin thirty years ago, after she admitted she had been unfaithful and intended to continue being so. Unable to comprehend that he was to be free, he only blinked his eyes and murmured "Thank you" when he was told he might leave the prison tomorrow. Attorney Joseph T. Penning of New London says he will get work in New York for Kennedy, or that he can work in the Norwich Insane Hospital. He had a perfect record in prison. Both men will have their first automobile ride tomorrow when the Warden's car will take them from the prison to this city.

EDWARD BARROW.

Ed Barrow, president of the International League, has defied the National Baseball Commission, the high court of baseball. He caused the passage of a resolution in the annual meeting of his directors refusing to pay to Charles Ebbetts, owner of the Brooklyn National League team, \$2,000 for the International League franchise in Newark, N. J. Ebbetts held the Newark franchise in the International League, and when the war came on with the Federal league he gave up the right to a club in Newark.
