HIGH QUALITY OF TURKEYS RAISED ON PROJECT CREW. ATTES BIG DEMAND.

HERMISTON, Dec. 20.—L. H. Pearson and F. A. Bronson shipped out about 4000 pounds of turkeys today. Most of these birds went to Portland to help supply the holiday market. A few, however, of Mr. Pearson's turkeys were shipped to Tacoma, having been contracted for by private parties. Testifying to the extra quality of the Hermiston turkeys, Mr. Pearson had an inquiry a few days ago from a Tacoma party in which he stated that he had had the good fortune to get hold of one of the Hermiston turkeys a couple of years ago, and inquired if it would be possible to get them direct this year. The shipment made today brought the top price in the Portland market.

Sam Rodgers, the shoe repair man, has had installed in his shop recently one of the most thoroughly up-to-date and modern shoe repairing machines on the market. It is nine machines in one, and is run by an electric motor. Every operation known to the shoe repairer may be done by this machine in less time than it takes to say it. Mr. Rodgers will make a specialty of the mail order business.
