Ordinance Is Introduced.

An ordinance providing for the buying of a Studebaker truck for the fire department from J. B. Knight for \$255 was introduced at the council last evening, but owing to the fact that there were not six councilmen present it could not be passed with an emergency clause attached.

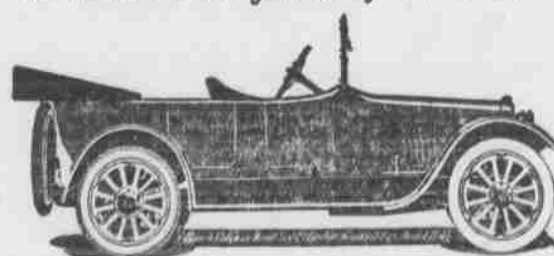
