COMADURANS AND HIS FOLLOWERS DISARMED

Action Follows Mexican Outpost's Flight to American Side of Border After Arrest.

(Webb Miller.) EL PASO, Dec. 20.—General Gonzalez, commandant at Juarez, ordered Colonel Luis Comaduran and his followers disarmed. The entire garrison marched to Cuartel and about 100 "Viva Trevino and Gonzalez" Comaduran's men occupied Cuartel. They were surprised and surrendered their arms.

The action followed Comaduran's flight to the American side of the border. Murguía appointed Comaduran commandant at Juarez but Gonzalez flatly refused to surrender authority. He ordered Comaduran arrested. After the flight Gonzalez asked the American authorities to surrender Comaduran as a deserter. No action was taken.

\$15,000 WANTED TO FIGHT RABIES

COMING LEGISLATURE WILL BE ASKED TO SET ASIDE THAT SUM YEARLY.

Sheepmen Decide That Double Bounty System is Not the Best Way of Getting Rid of Coyotes Which Are Responsible for Spread of Epidemic.

The coming legislature will be asked to appropriate \$15,000 a year for the next biennium to cooperate with the federal government in fighting the epidemic of rabies which has been prevalent throughout eastern Oregon during the past few years. This is the statement of E. F. Averill, district inspector for the biological survey who recently conferred with the sheepmen at their convention in Heppner and with Dr. David N. Roberg, state health officer. The sheepmen have decided that the double bounty system is not the best way of getting rid of the coyotes.

"I feel that we are gaining on the disease somewhat," said Mr. Averill, "but we need more professional hunters to get out on the ranges and kill off the coyotes. We had intended to ask the legislature to continue the double bounty on coyotes, but after conferences with sheepmen and others we have decided that the bounty system is not the best way of ridding the country of the danger. It is now proposed to ask the legislature for \$15,000 a year for the coming biennium to cooperate with the federal bureau in sending hunters into the districts affected and proceed with the killing in a systematic way.

"All the counties of eastern Oregon are now suffering from the ravages of rabid coyotes. A prominent factor also is the ranch dog, which once bitten, transmits the disease to cattle and sheep as badly as the coyotes. We need a law to empower the state officials to kill off these dogs that are suspected of being rapid. It is hard on the dogs, but the situation is so serious that something must be done about it."

CHUNK OF SUPPOSED AMBERGRIS FOUND

ABERDEEN, Wash., Dec. 20.—A chunk of supposed ambergris, weighing about 100 pounds and which, if it is ambergris, is worth about \$51,000, was found on the seashore near Glen Grayland yesterday by County Commissioner Phil S. Locke. Locke will send a piece of his find to Seattle for analysis.

Ambergris is now selling at \$52 an ounce.

A former whaler, who is somewhat familiar with ambergris, says he thinks Locke has made a big find.
