The rest of the estate will be divided between the widow and a son of the testator. An accounting on the property and assets of the estate has been filed in the surrogate's court by Luke Vincent Lockwood, the executor. He reported that he now has on hand \$841,485, having paid out \$111,877 to creditors and more than \$50,000 in expenses of various kinds. Mrs. Hannon was her father's pet. Just before his death he credited her with having inspired his decision to give up gambling.
