LIMIT ON BATTLESHIP'S SIZE. WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—American battleships will reach their limit of size when they displace 70,000 tons, the house naval committee was told today by the engineering chiefs of the navy, and only then because a greater ship could not pass through the locks of the Panama canal. Chief Constructor Taylor told the committee the battleships authorized at this session of congress will have a displacement of 43,600 tons in order to carry the main battery of 15 16-inch guns and make a speed of 23 knots. The total cost of each will be \$24,354,450 on present prices.

BEREA, Ky., Dec. 27.—Berea College students put Chicago's diet squad to shame. Seven cents a meal is what food cost each of the 1,400 students at the mountain institution, and at that figure those in charge of the boarding hall clear an average of \$559.45 a year.

President Wm. Goodell Frost, explaining this, refers to the economy of numbers and says that the students are accustomed to plain fare, so that they almost unanimously choose to do without tea, coffee and butter to reduce expenses. To offset these omissions the balanced ration has been introduced.
