FRANCE BARS IMPORT OF ALCOHOLIC DRINK

New Regulation, Taking Effect at Once, Also Includes Colony of Algeria.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—In line with the recent decision of the government to suppress the consumption of alcoholic beverages, with the exception of wines and beer, a decree published today in the Journal Officiel prohibits the importation of alcohol into France and Algeria from this date.

The decree excepts alcohol bought for the account of the French government, as well as shipments made directly for France and Algeria prior to the date of promulgation of the decree.

FRANCE CONVICTS TWO WOMEN SPIES

Berlin Reports They Have Received Death Sentence After Court-Martial.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—(by Wireless)—An Overseas News Agency statement today says:

"French courts-martial have sentenced to death two more women, one Dussys by name, born in Calais of a German mother and a Luxemburg father; the other a widow named Tichelly of Swiss nationality. Both were accused of giving information to Germany regarding the operations of the French army."

"The game laws of the state prohibit the trapping or disturbing of any game or protected fur bearing animals upon any state or national game refuge," said Warden Tonkin. "Trappers should bear this in mind as mink and muskrat are protected at all times on these preserves. Where these animals are damaging property on these game reserves the renter or owner of the land may apply to the deputy state game warden for this county and through him receive permission from the state warden to trap or destroy any such animals."
