17. SHE IS A HOG EXPERT.

California Girl Hates Porkers for Pleasure and Profit.

HOLTSVILLE, Cal., Jan. 3.—Raising hogs for pleasure and profit is the occupation of Miss Josie Fuller, seventeen, youngest and best all-around feminine pork producer in the Imperial valley. It is her ambition to become the best expert on hogs in her district. Her herd numbers fifty, and is increasing.

"Pig culture isn't esthetic work, of course," said Miss Fuller. "It can't be considered a finishing school for debutantes, but there's money in it." She has established a record of developing her porkers for the market at a cost of 2 1/2 cents a pound.

REUNITED AFTER 19 YEARS.

Young Woman Finds Mother Through "Ad" in Christmas Day Paper.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—After nineteen years, Mrs. Christine Minski of No. 161 Stookholm street, Brooklyn, found her mother in New Brunswick, N. J., yesterday.

The mother, Mrs. Woerner, then Mrs. Henry Holzhauser, was left alone with her four-year-old child when her husband died. She was forced to put the child in an institution and lost track of Christine when she was placed in a private family.

The family told the little girl about her mother and for five years the young woman maintained a constant search for the parent. On Christmas Day an advertisement in a New Brunswick paper attracted the attention of Detective George Dunn, who traced Mrs. Woerner.

WRONG AT BOTH ENDS.

Legge's Hair Too Red for His Girl; Feet Too Flat for Uncle Sam.

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—His hair is red and his feet are flat and therefore neither husband nor hero may he become.

A girl turned down Albert P. Legge of Waukegan, Ill., because of his crimson topknot and this brought about such a condition of disconsolation that he betook himself to the recruiting station of the United States marine corps in his city and offered himself as a fighting man.

LIEUT. CASTLE TEACHES DANCING AT THE FRONT

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—In an old French chateau, five miles behind the trenches, First Lieutenant Vernon Castle of the British Flying Corps has found a piano, and gives daily dancing lessons to the other members of the corps. Second Lieut. G. L. Faulkner of the Royal Aero Club of London told a reporter at the Hotel McAlphin last night.

"Our actual work is only about three and one-half hours a day," said Lieut. Faulkner. "and since we have none of the red tape of the other departments, we are left pretty much to ourselves. All the boys like Vernon Castle for his unassuming manner and his bravery."

THIS GOLDEN EAGLE IS NO COUNTERFEIT

Captured Bird Flights Hard for Freedom With Beak and Talons.

WATERBURY, Conn., Jan. 5.—A fine golden eagle was captured by hunters last night in Prospect. This fellow had been a terror to farmers for some time killing poultry. His pet aversion was guinea fowl, the sentries of farms.

The eagle was caught in a tree after a terrific fight with clubs by Edward C. Mulvaney, Edward Bergin and Edward McGinn. It stands 3 feet high, is 2 feet long, measures 3 feet from tip to tip of its wings, and weighs nearly 25 pounds.

During its shifting from crate to cage it fastened its talons in the thigh of James Hurley, clawed A. Gonzales, tore the skin from the hands of Poston Sharp of Brookline, and bit savagely the finger of Scully Barton, a messenger boy, who put his hand in "to see if it was stuffed."

MORE REPORTS OF RAIDER.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Reports of a German raider in the Atlantic were given added color by stories of officers and passengers of the French liner Espana. They told of the ship's changing course suddenly in the Bay of Biscay, after sighting an unidentified vessel last night. The lights were extinguished when she began asking the liner's name and destination. They distanced the pursuer. The passengers were given charts of the lifeboats and each seat was identified.

SENATE STATE DEPARTMENT MENT SCANDAL IN STOCK DEALS.

Representative William R. Wood, republican of Indiana, has introduced in the house a resolution for the appointment by the speaker of a committee to investigate the stock market speculation Thursday, Dec. 21, which grew out of two statements issued by Secretary of State Lansing about President Wilson's note to the European belligerents. He asks that the committee ascertain if any one high in the administration or a relative of any one there profited by the fluctuations of the market on the secretary's statements.

JOHN HAYS HAMMOND LOSES \$238,700 SUIT

Liable to Damages for That Sum Jury Finds in Action Over Patent Rights.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 5.—That John Hays Hammond, the mining engineer, by failing to see that stock in General Cotton Securities Company was returned to Addison C. Dubois, a patent attorney, and Willard Doremus, an inventor, had made himself liable to \$238,700 damages, was the verdict rendered by a jury in the superior court here last night. An appeal will be taken.
