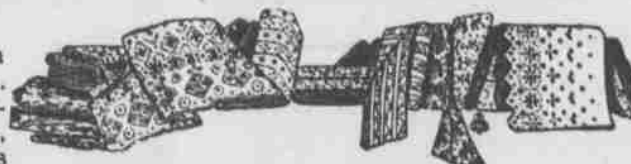
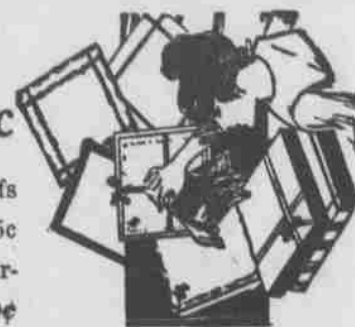

FORMER LOCAL MAN HAS BIG HOLDING IN FAMOUS MINE

George F. Webb, formerly one of the owners of the Independent Garage in this city, and Mrs. Webb, who was commercial instructor in the high school, have taken up the mining game at Kamloops, B. C., according to a letter received from Mr. Webb by a friend. They have purchased 125,000 shares of stock in the United Six Mining Co., Inc., which owns 15 properties comprising 750 acres.

The corporation is capitalized at a million dollars, according to Mr. Webb, and is just starting the construction of a \$20,000 plant at the mine. Operations will begin April 1; he states, and the mill will treat 50 tons of ore a day. The ore assays \$25 per ton, he states, while mining and milling costs but \$2.55 per ton.

Mr. and Mrs. Webb have been in Kamloops all winter. They report the thermometer down to 15 below at Christmas time but expect the cold spell to be over in February. Mr. Webb declares the country is infested with coyotes, he having killed 29 himself during spare moments.

TWO MORE AVIATION STATIONS ORDERED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Two more flying stations for the army—one in Hawaii and the other in the canal zone—are to be established immediately.

The war department issued orders today for Captain George H. Arnold, now a junior military aviator at the San Diego, Cal. flying school, to leave at once to organize the Panama station. Captain John F. Curry was ordered to Kamehameha, Hawaii, to organize his station here. Captain John B. Brooks will accompany him as supply officer.
