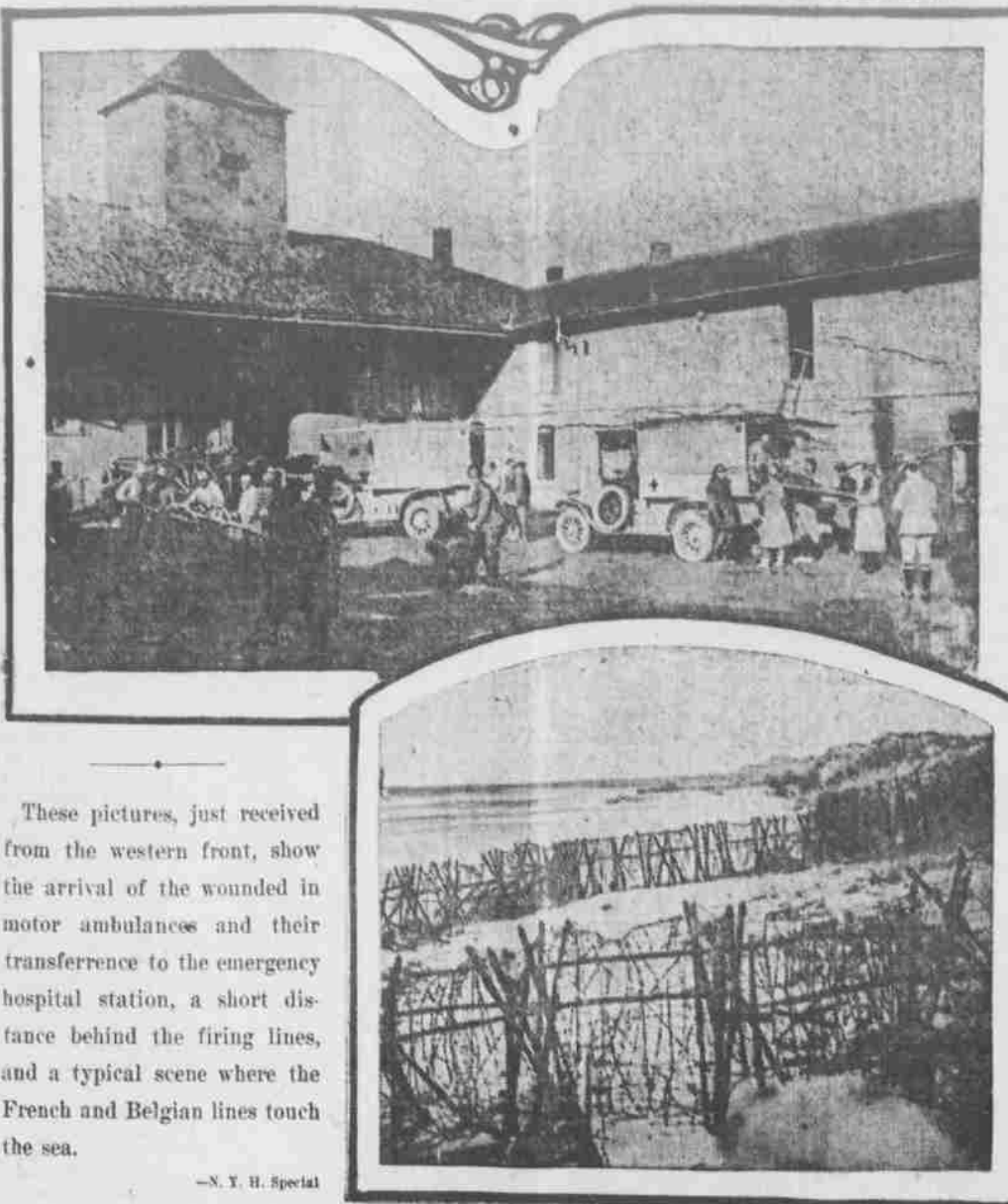

"SPOOKS" TOLLS BIG, BOOK SHOWS

Spiritualists' Accounts Indicate Rich Paid Steep Prices to Talk Beyond SUFF.

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—Perusal of the "red book," which is just as important in the spiritual world as the blue book is to society leaders, led the police here to believe today that wealthy persons in New York, Milwaukee and Chicago have donated large sums of cash and other worldly goods to hear voices from the past.

The book with various crosses and checks beside the names listed in it, was found in the seance parlors of Mme. Mona Allen. Detective questioned a dozen or more Chicago men and women whose names appear. Warrants charging Mme. Allen and her husband, Robert W. Allen, with operating a confidence game are held by the police.

The detective department declined to reveal the names of the wealthy victims found in the book.

In the warrants, Mrs. Sophie Beckman of Chicago, is complainant. She alleges that in seances she gave Mme. Allen, a \$500 diamond ring and a deed to a \$1000 farm, demanded by the spirit. Mme. Allen said she had returned the ring and intended to give back the deed and that the \$400 was merely a loan.

The Allens said they came here from New York six months ago.

CYANIDE PRICE HITS EASTERN OREGON MINES

SUMPTER, Ore., Jan. 12.—An encouraging feature of the future outlook of Sumpter from the mining point of view is the resuming of active operation at the Bonanza mine. This is one of the most famous mines of the state. At one time it was sold at a figure upwards of \$500,000, and it has a record of having produced more than \$3,000,000. Al Geisler, now operating the Conner Creek mines, was the owner when the Bonanza was at its best, and it was he who sold it to a Pittsburgh company.

The old mine now belongs to Frank Moore of Pittsburgh. Frank Dodson is the manager of the mine and has a force of men retimbering the old shaft preparatory to starting underground work in the spring on an extensive scale. The Bonanza shaft is the deepest one in the state, being more than 1200 feet deep.

The scarcity and high price of cyanide is having its effect upon eastern Oregon mining, and if it should continue for any length of time it is hard to say how far reaching this effect will be. The Cougar mine near Granite has been closed down because of inability to secure cyanide for reducing ores, and it will be three or four months before work can be resumed there.

Price of Cyanide Is High.

Dealers in cyanide will not agree to fill the mine's orders in less than 60 days, and then the best price that can be obtained is \$1 a pound. In normal times 25 cents a pound is considered a high price for this chemical.

It is considered quite a blow to the mining industry at this time to have the Cougar mine close. The shut-down puts 50 men out of employment. The mine was just being put in successful operation after having been idle for a number of years. It is being operated by Spokane capitalists, who in the past year have spent fully \$100,000 in getting the mine on its feet again.

DESERTERS DO NOT FARE WELL IN SOUTH

COLUMBUS, N. M., Jan. 12.—Deserters from the army are not safe from capture and punishment even in the wild mountain country that divides Chihuahua and Sonora states. Last night five men in soldiers' uniforms rode into camp guarded by 11 other soldiers. The prisoners were deserters, who left camp several nights ago, taking their rifles and equipment with them. The morning after the desertion a detachment was sent in pursuit. Heading this detachment were four Apache Indian trackers.

The missing men were captured without a fight 95 miles southeast of this camp, far back in the mountains.
