COSTS \$59,000 TO MAINTAIN STATE HOUSE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12.—The joint ways and means committee put the stamp of its approval on the budget estimate of Secretary of State Olcott for the maintenance of the capitol building and grounds, amounting to \$59,450.

The committee cut nothing from Mr. Olcott's requests, and when he showed that it is costing less to run the capitol buildings and maintain their extensive grounds than it is to maintain the Portland city hall, or the Multnomah county courthouse, he even won the vote of Senator La Follette of Marion who seems to have an ironbound resolution with himself to vote "no" on all appropriations.

Olcott, in discussing his budget, showed figures which he had secured from Portland and Multnomah county showing the cost of maintaining the two public buildings of city and county during the year 1916. According to these the Multnomah courthouse had 34 employees at an average salary of \$72.50 per month, while the

cost of maintaining the courthouse building was \$2465 a month. The city hall had 11 employees, at an average salary of \$95.22 per month with a monthly maintenance charge of \$1047.50.

The state maintained the capitol buildings and grounds consisting of the state house, supreme court building and the extensive lawns surrounding them, during 1916 with 14 employees at an average wage of \$76.75 and a monthly maintenance charge of \$1074.

The committee also scanned the budgets of the state library and the superintendent of public instruction and listened to the explanation of the items as made by Miss Marvin and Superintendent Churchill. No action was taken on these.

The committee will meet each night at 8 o'clock during the remainder of the session, or until its work has been concluded.
