AGREEMENT REACHED UPON RURAL CREDITS

People Who Own Land But Reside in Town Are Classed As Residing Upon Farm Property; Water Rights Are Recognized.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 13.—Agreement was reached Thursday by C. E. Spence, master of the state grange, and other representatives of the organizations which initiated the rural credits amendment to the constitution, and the state land board, on the provisions of a bill to provide the machinery for the general operation of the rural credits amendment. Attorney General Brown was requested to draft the bill.

One of the features of the bill will be a recognition of adjudicated water rights as part of the value of the land upon which loans may be sought under the act. This will be an aid to farmers in irrigation districts, as the amendment provides loans shall not exceed 50 per cent of the value of the land.

It was also agreed that the measure shall define "persons residing on the land" to include persons who own the land and operate it under their direction, although they may be residing temporarily elsewhere. This is done to meet conditions where families remove from the farm to town for the sake of school advantages but retain the farm as their home.

The bill will define the procedure for issuing bonds and will require the handling of the rural credits fund with the same organization established by the state land board for loaning the \$6,000,000 in the common school fund.
