E. B. Wood, chief special agent of the O-W-R & N., and J. P. Hannon, special agent for the division, are making Pendleton a visit.

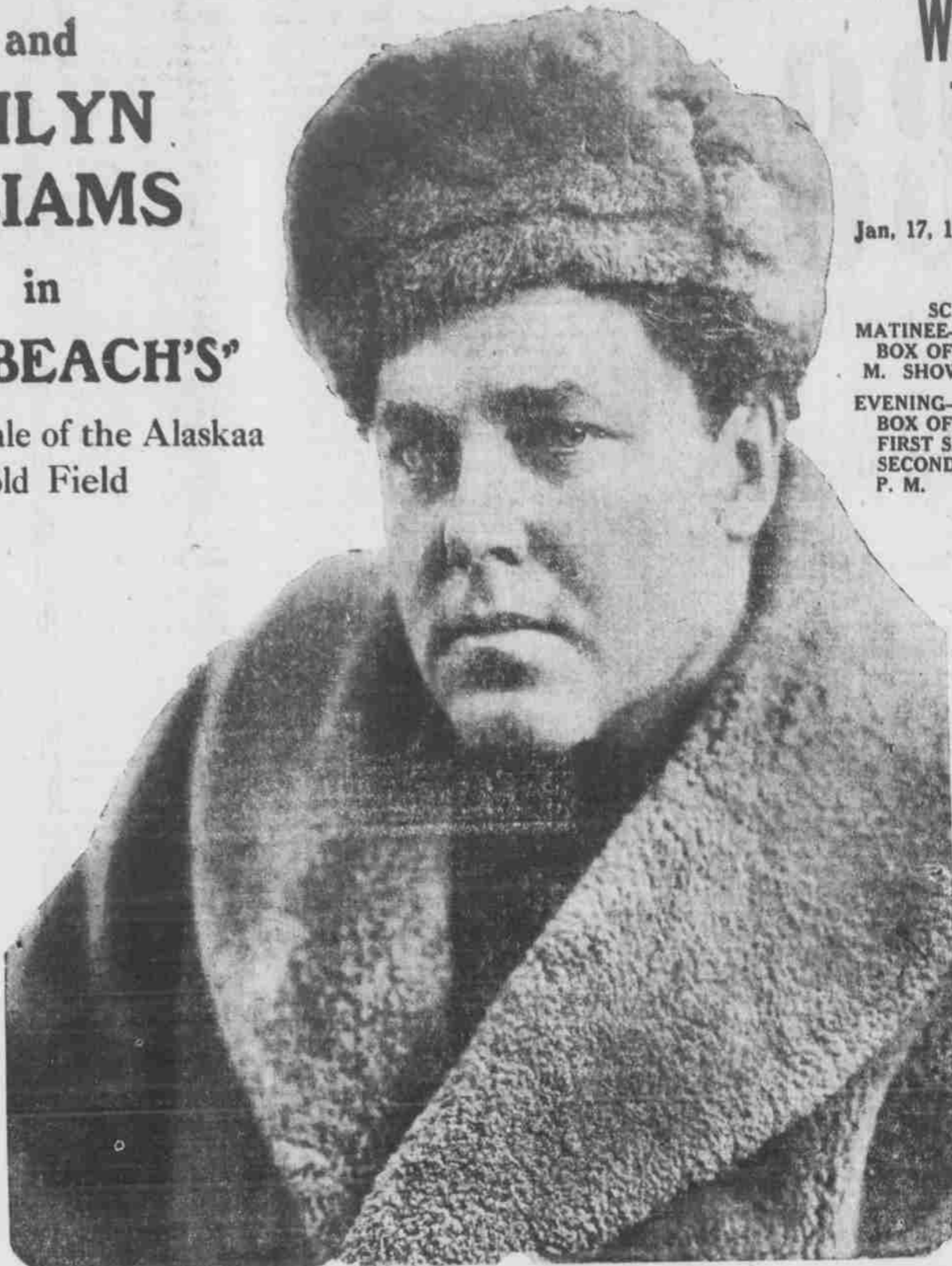
