MANY STUDENTS LEAVE STATE FOR SCHOOLING

Union Reports That of 16 High School Graduates in Last Class Only One Pursues Studies Here.

UNION, Ore., Jan. 18.—If conditions existing in this locality are duplicated in other localities, it is evident that Oregon is losing a good deal of money each year by permitting young people to go to other states for their higher education.

Last spring the Union high school, which has a student body of 50 or 60, graduated a class of 16. Out of that number only one entered an Oregon school, one boy having entered the agricultural college. Seven others of this class have entered institutions

outside the state. Two went to the normal school at Ellensburg, Wash.; one to Washington State College, at Pullman; one to San Jose Normal; one to a denominational school at Caldwell, Idaho; one to a dental college at Kansas City, Mo., and one received an appointment to the naval academy at Annapolis.

Aside from the money loss involved there is the additional disadvantage that the young people of the state are alienated in their interest from the affairs of their home commonwealth at the most impressionable age. The situation at Union may not be typical but it is believed that an examination of the roster at Whitman, Pullman, Ellensburg and Bellingham, as well as the University of Washington, which claims an Oregon club with a membership of 120, would reveal that Washington is entertaining a host of young Oregon people. On the south, California takes another large quota, amounting to 10 or more each year.
