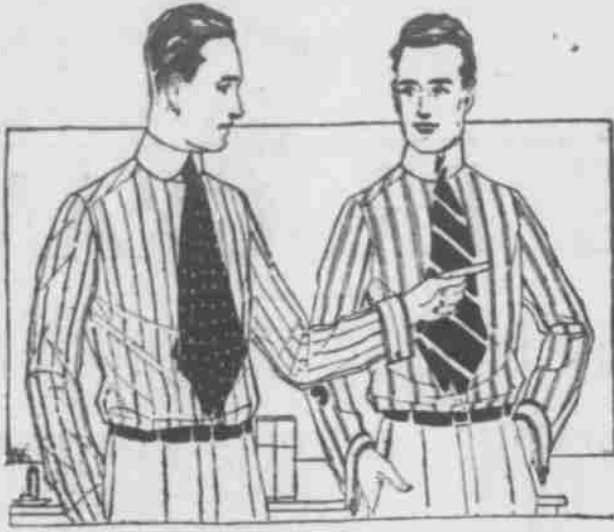

## HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Both the physics and chemistry departments have shown a substantial increase over the enrollment of last year. Practically all juniors and seniors who expect to attend college are taking one of the two subjects, besides a number who are taking the work as an aid in domestic science, manual training, etc. Physics probably gives the student an expansion of more common, everyday phenomena than any other high school sciences.

The laboratory work gives an opportunity to come into first hand contact with the principles which are developed in the class room. An X-ray machine, wireless demonstration set, a large telescope, a good supply of electrical instruments, and other pieces of apparatus which are usually found only in the larger schools, help to make the laboratory work of a valuable and practical nature.

In the chemistry work an attempt is made to emphasize the use and applications of chemistry to commercial work. The laboratory equipment is particularly valuable as a great many pieces come originally from Germany and at the present time are practically unobtainable. Work in the laboratory will give the students a knowledge of simple tests on food products, valuable minerals, etc.; also industrial chemistry is studied, as shown in the local ice plant, gas plant and foundry.

A class in general science has been organized for the students entering high school this semester. They will be given a general though somewhat limited view of the whole field of science. In this way they will be enabled to decide quite definitely just what branches they may care to study still further. To those who do not take any other science work it gives a much broader view than any science alone could. It is expected that the general science course will become a very popular part of the work of the science department.
