WILLIAM DE MORGAN, ARTIST-AUTHOR, DIES

Wrote His First Novel, "Joseph Vance," for Recreation, Then Made Fortune With Pen.

LONDON, Jan. 26.—William Friend De Morgan, seventy-seven, an artist, who turned novelist at sixty-five, is dead from stomach trouble at his home at Chelsea.

He was the son of Augustus De Morgan, professor of mathematics in University College, London. His mother was a daughter of William Friend, whom Cambridge College expelled for heretical opinions.

After a course at the Royal Academy De Morgan took up, in 1864, the making and designing of stained glass. From 1870 to 1904 he was a manufacturer of artistic pottery.

His first novel, "Joseph Vance" he began while ill. It was published in 1906 and immediately became popular. Then came "An Ill Written Autobiography," "Alice for Short," "Somehow Good," "It Can Never Happen Again," "An Affair of Dishonor," "A Likely Story," and "When Ghost Meets Ghost."

The opening chapters of "Joseph Vance" were written for recreation, with no thought of publication, and snatched strongly of Dickens, the author felt he said, because he began to read "Boz" at seven and read him all through life. The completed novel was rejected by one publisher but accepted by the next. Thereafter De Morgan had a ready market and made a fortune out of literature.

MOVIE ACTRESS DIES COMPANION ARRESTED

Woman is Found Dead in Blood Soaked Bed; Man Claims Death Was Due to Hemorrhage.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—Neil Harvey, a motion picture actress, was found lying dead in a blood soaked bed. Harlan J. Winter, an actor, known to have been with her last night, was arrested. He claimed the woman died from a hemorrhage. Winter is greatly excited. He talked coherently after he was arrested and cried protestations of innocence repeatedly from his cell. After the death Winter donned a few clothes, left the hotel and ran to a neighboring lodging house. There were several cuts and bruises on the woman's body. Winter claimed she sustained them when she fell as she went to the bathroom, suffering from weakness. Winter may be released after the autopsy.

BILLINGS, Mont., Jan. 26.—Crazed by drugs and believing he had discovered a method of restoring human life, Dr. J. C. Hunter, well-known physician and research worker, tried the experiment by killing his wife at their home at Hysham, Mont., several days ago. Her body was found today.

1100 FIRES FOUGHT IN ONE DISTRICT BY THE U. S. FOREST SERVICE

Nine Thousand Acres of Timberland and Ten Thousand Acres of Open Land Burned Over.

PORTLAND, Jan. 26.—Six fires on the national forests of Oregon, Washington and Alaska burned over 9000 acres of timberland, destroyed 25 million board feet of merchantable timber worth \$23,000, young growth and forage worth \$12,000, and cost the forest service \$19,000 to subdue during the fire season of 1916, according to a complete report just compiled in the office of District Forester George H. Cecil, Portland, Oregon.

In addition to the timberland, more than 10,000 acres of open country was also burned over.

The fires on the national forests of this district for 1916 were distributed as follows: Alaskan 28, Washington, 185, and Oregon 642. In number of fires reported, the Sitka national forest in Oregon leads the district with 242 fires. The Snoqualmie forest in Washington stands second with a record of 177 fires for the season. The least number of fires occurred on the Tongass forest, Alaska, where three were reported.

Sixty per cent of these 1176 fires were discovered and put out before they had gained headway enough to cover a quarter of an acre. Thirty-two fires, less than three per cent of the total number, burned over more

than ten acres and did damage to exceed \$100 before they were put under control.

Any one of the 1144 other fires if left to itself might have become a large forest fire, says District Forester Cecil.

Campers caused 23 per cent of all the fires reported. Lightning was responsible for 19 per cent, railroads for 8 1-2 per cent, logging operations 6 1-2, brush burning 6. The remainder were from miscellaneous and unknown causes. These figures do not indicate that campers are becoming more careless with fire than formerly, but that there was a great increase in the number of tourists and campers visiting the forests, according to Mr. Cecil.

Nearly 13000 of the \$19,000 spent by the forest service in fire fighting in this district last year was used on private land within or adjacent to the national forests, to subside fires which threatened to enter the forests. Timberland owners furnished cooperation to the amount of \$5,264.62. Excellent cooperation was given by the state foresters of Oregon and Washington.
