JAPAN TO PUT \$53,000,000 THIS YEAR INTO HER NAVY

TOKYO, Jan. 26.—Japan will spend about \$53,314,370 on her navy in 1917, an increase of \$2,184,597 over the previous year's estimates. More than half the total is classed as "extraordinary" expenditure for various items, some of them due to the war.

The sum of \$7,164,694 is for continuing the seven-year building programme, among the ships being three battle cruisers, three large and six small scout cruisers, twenty-seven destroyers and eighteen submarines.

Mr. Whipp in New York Soon.
Coenraad Bos, the eminent vocal coach and pianist, who is en tour with Madame Julia Culp as accompanist, left this city Thursday morning for Tacoma, Wash., where they appeared Thursday night in recital at the Tacoma theater. During Mr. Bos' visit here of nearly a week two of Portland's leading vocalists availed themselves of the opportunity thus afforded and coached with him daily in repertoire and interpretation. Mrs. Mylene Praker Sittes, contralto, began her work with Mr. Bos in New York last winter, at which time he agreed to arrange a stopover in Portland in order to continue Mrs. Sittes' work. The other Portland singer accepted by Mr. Bos for coaching was Hartridge Whipp, baritone. These two singers were fortunate in being able to secure the time of a man who has a world-wide reputation as a vocal coach and as an authority on interpretation. Mr. Bos was quite enthusiastic about the work accomplished by his two Portland students, and upon his return to New York, the second week of April, 1917, will complete arrangements for Mr. Whipp to appear in a song recital at Aeolian Hall, New York City, in November. Mr. Bos has chosen a date in November for the recital, inasmuch as he will be in New York at that time, and will act as Mr. Whipp's accompanist.—Sunday Oregonian, January 7th.

ELEVEN DOLLAR HOG MARKET HIT

PORTLAND, Jan. 26.—Eleven dollar hogs were a reality in the North Portland yards during the day and even a dime above this would be obtainable for select quality heavy packers.

There was an advance of at least 5¢ to 10¢ in the price of swine in the local yards during the morning with only a very limited run available for the trade. It has been a number of years since the price struck the present high mark. The prospects according to the trade are for still higher figures.
