To Hold Meetings at 8:30.

Will Elect Directors.

A meeting of those interested in the Westland Irrigation project, recently organized, has been called for tomorrow at the Butter Creek school house for the purpose of electing directors.

Takes Position Here.

Tyler, who is to become general manager of the Cottonbelt road out of St. Louis. The Pasco division includes authority over the Pendleton-Pasco branch road.

To Talk Bulk Grain.

Another meeting for the purpose of discussing the desirability of handling grain in bulk is to be held here by the Farmers Union Elevator Co. about February 20 by which time it is expected the company's elevator will be in operation. A superintendent for the elevator has not yet been chosen.

Sells Quarter Section.

Earl P. Tulloch has sold a quarter section of land north of Pendleton to George A. Sievers, well known farmer, for \$14,000. The deal was concluded yesterday through W. H. Morrison of Helix. The land is described as the NE 1-4 of section 29, Township 3 north, range 22, and is one of three quarters purchased about two years ago by Mr. Tulloch for \$22,900. The transaction was a cash one.

Attend Democratic Meeting.

Will Moore left yesterday for Portland to attend the state democratic central committee meeting, he being the committeeman from this county. Will M. Peterson, former chairman of the county committee, and Postmaster T. J. Tweedy left on No. 17 today to attend the meeting tomorrow and to go on to Salem to watch the legislative work. Sam Pace, committeeman from Wallowa county, was here yesterday en route down. At the meeting the committee will discuss the matter of political appointments.

Negro Was Old Offender.

William Rogers, the colored man who was recently sent to the penitentiary from this county for the shooting affray and attempted robbery in the Umatilla Club, is an old offender. Under the name of M. C. Moore, he served two terms in the Montana state penitentiary at Deer Lodge, according to word received by Sheriff Taylor, and is believed to be wanted in either San Francisco or Los Angeles as an escape. The communication states that he wants to be a "bad nigger."

Rabies Rampant at Prineville.

"During the past month or so reports have been reaching this office almost every day of the death of cattle in the immediate vicinity of Prineville from 'rabies.'" Forest Supervisor Ross of Prineville reports to Inspector Averill. "Two cows died yesterday on Ochoco creek, 20 miles east of here and one went mad today on McKay creek, seven miles north of here. Four mad coyotes have been killed within 20 miles of Prineville during the last three weeks and others have been seen. It therefore appears that the epidemic is worse in this locality at present than it has ever been before, and stockmen report that there are more coyotes in this vicinity than they have seen for several years." Mr. Averill will dispatch a hunter to the section named.
