WHAT IS FILM STAR? PRODUCER TELLS US

"One for Whom Orchestra Seats Have to Be Moved," He Says.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—Motion picture stars take most of the profits of the film business but assume no risks, according to Patrick A. Powers, of the Universal Film Manufacturing Co., a witness today before the legislative committee which is considering the question of whether the picture business should be taxed.

"I know of three stars who this year will make more money than will be split up by the entire moving picture industry," Mr. Powers declared.

"Don't the stars, in many cases, share in the profits in addition to their salaries?" asked a member of the committee.

"No," said Mr. Powers, "they take no chances. They take it all."

Asked for a definition of a star, he replied: "A star is one for whom the orchestra seats have to be moved out."

Chicago Bandit Menaces Detroit Man Who Volunteered to Aid Cashier.

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—Nearly a hundred guests and employees of a hotel lunch room in the center of Chicago's business section were held at bay by an armed man while he took \$20 from the cash drawer. E. N. Brodick, a Detroit automobile man, rushed forward to protect the cashier, but the bandit turned one of the revolvers on him.

GIVES HIS LIFE TO SAVE HIS MEN

PARIS, Feb. 3.—A striking act of courage and self-sacrifice was recently recorded by the biographer of Lieutenant-Colonel Patrice Mahon.

Allowing himself to be killed resting on his cannon in order to give an example and to prevent a precipitate retreat," reads the order of the day crediting him for his heroism. Four other officers imitated his example: Captain Doridot, now a prisoner, wounded and his right hand amputated and Lieutenants Roger, Michel and Nyegard, all three reported disappeared.

The pass of Sainte-Marie aux Mines was the scene of the death of Mahon. Twice before he had tried to save the pass, first on asking to go there personally when he should have remained at Saules with the general staff. Then, while leading his troops who, surprised by a frightful attack, had retired in disorder he succeeded momentarily in bringing them back in a counter attack. Another time French infantrymen composed principally of reservists were confronted by hot enemy attack; they were obliged to fall back in disorder the round being impossible to hold. Mahon, however, did not lose his coolness. Dismounting from his horse proudly, crossing his arms, he placed himself before one of his guns facing the enemy, there waiting until he was killed. He lies between French and German lines and despite the continual danger, a number of officers have vainly tried to recover his body.

GIDDY MOTHER-IN-LAW BESTS GIRL AT "LOVE"

Flirtation With Son-in-Law Ends in Their Departure to Another State.

PUEBLO, Col., Feb. 3.—Theodore D. Poulos doesn't dislike his mother-in-law. Quite the contrary; where Theodore is being sued for divorce. WEDDING WOES ARRIVE EARLY IN OHIOAN'S LIFE

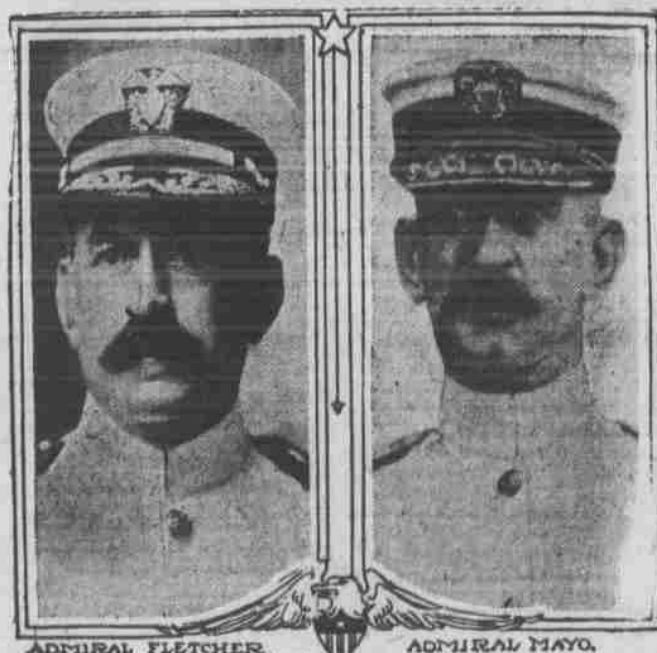
BUCYRUS, Feb. 3.—Because he got married, Nelson F. Steele was compelled to move from Bucyrus.
