WHAT THE BONE DRY LAW MEANS

No Liquor Can Be Imported Into State and It Is Unlawful to Possess or Possess It; Wholesale Druggists May Import and Sell Alcohol Under Permit.

Under the bone dry law no liquor can be legally imported into the state. It is unlawful to receive it or to possess it. But this does not apply to liquor lawfully purchased and received before the law went into effect, which was a week Friday afternoon. A provision is also made giving railroad and express companies five days in which to complete delivery of liquor contained in them for transportation before the law went into effect.

The law permits wholesale druggists to obtain a permit from the district attorney, and they can sell only to persons or firms who have permits from the district attorney to buy. The district attorney may issue permits to wholesale druggists, to manufacturers requiring alcohol in producing their products, provided they do not make intoxicating liquors of any kind, to retail druggists, to physicians, to state infirmaries, to hospitals, to laboratories for medical colleges, to dentists for use in their professional work, to persons engaged in art or industry aside from making liquors, requiring alcohol.

Manufacturers must file with the district attorney, before they can purchase any alcohol, a bond for \$250 as assurance they will not violate the law.

Physicians are allowed to prescribe alcohol and registered pharmacists to fill such prescriptions, but no person can purchase in this manner more than one quart in 24 days.

Must file prescription. Registered pharmacists may also sell alcohol to persons having a permit from the district attorney.

Each purchaser must sign an affidavit, whether he buys on prescription or permit, and a copy of such prescription and each permit issued during the month must be filed with the county clerk, not later than the tenth day of the following month.

A physician is prohibited from issuing a prescription for alcohol in such form that it could be used as a beverage.

Ministers may obtain from the district attorney a permit to import wine for sacramental purposes.

The law also defines and prescribes penalties for drunkenness. This is the first statewide law defining drunkenness, as that heretofore has been left to regulation by city ordinance.

HATPIN BURGLAR'S TOOL

Easy Way to Open Locked Doors Told by Chicago Robber.

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Adam Prohowski, arrested in Evansville, Ind., and brought to Chicago, today confessed that he recently robbed the homes of several wealthy residents of the Lake Shore drive district, according to State Attorney Hoyne. Prohowski said the robberies were accomplished with the aid of a "jiminy," a long hatpin and a newspaper. After "jiminying" his way into a house he would unlock bedroom doors by cracking a newspaper through the key out at the bottom, pushing the key out upon the paper with the hatpin and then drawing the key out.

Death Sentence Passed on Slayer of Mrs. Nicholas.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Death in the electric chair at Sing Sing during the week of March 5 was the sentence given Arthur Waltonen today for his participation in the murder of Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols, an aged widow, in September, 1915. Justice Bonasky said he would forward to Governor Whitman the jury's recommendation for mercy, based on his opinion that Waltonen was weak-minded.
