KNIFE BLADE IN MAN'S JAW SEVERAL YEARS, REMOVED

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 12.—A jack-knife blade, 2 1/2 inches long and 1/8 of an inch wide was taken yesterday from the right jaw of Marion Chavis, a Mexican, in St. Mary's Hospital, East St. Louis. Dr. Charles Winnick, who performed the operation, said the blade appeared to have been embedded in the jaw for five years. The patient has been unable to talk sufficiently to explain how it came there. Chavis is a sheep butcher at the Swift packing house. Three weeks ago a roller fell and struck him on the jaw. A serious swelling resulted, and X-ray examination, for what was at first supposed to be a fracture of the bone, showed the presence of a foreign substance. It now appears that the blade had been broken off in the man's cheek, and that a protecting tissue was formed about it, which rendered it harmless until the recent accident. This accident broke the end of the blade and caused a new inflammation, which is now yielding to treatment.

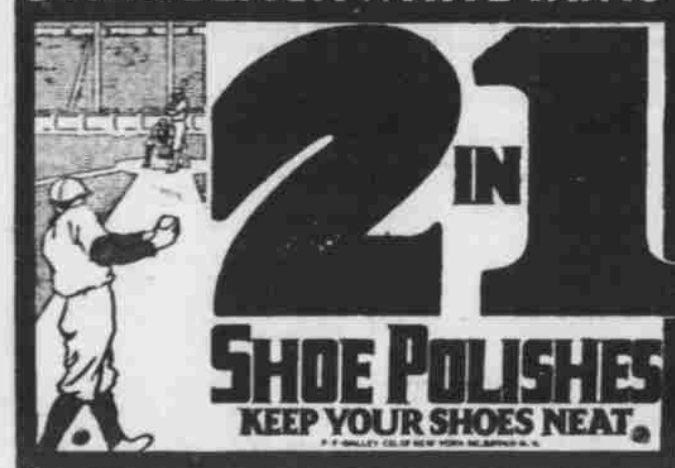
