The children, who had been three days on the journey, were warmly welcomed by the Franco-Dutch committee. Their ages ranged from six to 14 years. They presented a most distressing spectacle, bearing evident signs of having suffered want and hardships, and all told sad stories of scarcity of food and lack of milk, bread and meat.

After they had eaten a good meal the children were divided into groups and will be distributed to seven farms where they will remain until the end of the war.

The arrival of 2500 more children is expected shortly.

**POLICE SIFT THREE-STORY PAL LOF CHORUS GIRL.**

RAY CITY, Mich., Feb. 20.—Jennie Bruce, 20, a chorus girl member of Billy Malone's Review, playing a local theater, is in a critical condition at Mercy hospital, from injuries suffered in a headlong fall from a third story window of the Republic house to a cement pavement at 2 o'clock this morning.

She will be operated on tonight. She has a fractured skull, lacerated scalp, fractured arm and internal injuries. Her husband, Louis Bruce, of Detroit, arrived late this afternoon and has been at his wife's bedside since Mrs. Bruce came here for a two week engagement and was occupying a room with Belle Marcella. After the performance last night there was a little party in the room and at its end Miss Marcella went to bed. Sidney Dawson, electrician at a theater here, was passing the room and saw Mrs. Bruce on the window sill of the open window. He heard her fall and gave the alarm.

Police do not believe the window had been kept wide open with 10-bar low zero weather prevailing, but have no evidence of either suicide or foul play.
