BALTIMORE ALARMED OVER DEATH RATE OF NEGROES

BALTIMORE, Feb. 24.—To meet a situation of "alarming gravity," Mayor Preston announced that he had called a meeting of 150 physicians, social workers and representative citizens to devise ways of improving the health of the negroes of the city. The negro death rate is twenty-eight to thirty-two a thousand, while the death rate of whites is six to eight.

It is understood that the mayor will announce a plan for partial segregation of negroes.

LIVESTOCK MARKET VERY FIRM

PORTLAND, Feb. 24.—There is a firmer tone noted generally in the livestock trade at North Portland. Heavy hogs of quality are quoted at \$12.60, while light stuff is unchanged to 5c higher. There was a rather fair run of hogs in the North Portland yards over night, but early sales cleaned up everything in sight at strong prices.

That there are 25,000,000 cats in the United States, one to every four persons, is the assertion of Dr. Frank Chapman, of the American Museum of Natural History, and acting on that Theodore Douglas Robinson, nephew of Colonel Roosevelt and member of the lower house of the legislature of New York, has introduced a bill, which, if it becomes a law, will require every owner of a cat in New York state to pay a license of 75 cents a year. Cats according to Dr. Chapman, every year do damage to the sum of 100,000,000 to the farmers of the Mississippi valley. They eat so many wild birds that the chickens thrive and thus eat the crops. The total damage caused by cats each year is declared to be \$1,200,000,000.
