## NEWS OF PENDLETON

**Speaks at High School.**  
Dr. Conklin of the University of Oregon, spoke to the students on "Habit and Attention." It was one of the most interesting talks heard by the students this year.

**Mercury Down to 6 Above.**  
Last night was the coldest Pendleton has experienced for several weeks, the thermometer registered six above zero. As a result quite a number of water pipes were frozen.

**Elks Elect Tonight.**  
The annual election of officers of Pendleton lodge No. 23, B. P. O. E., will be held this evening. A large attendance is expected and an oyster supper will be served following the meeting.

**R. A. M. Confers Degrees.**  
Pendleton chapter, Royal Arch Masons, met last evening and conferred the past master and most excellent master degrees upon Dr. R. E. Farnsworth, Mum Carson, Hans Pahl, and Guy Wyrick of this city and H. S. Denison of Freewater.

**Tearing Out Old Building.**  
Work was begun today on tearing out the old frame building on Court street formerly occupied by G. I. Gadow. This property was recently purchased by the Pendleton Auto Co. which is to build a new garage at that location.

**Mother Claims Son's Body.**  
Mrs. C. Johnson of Portland arrived this morning to claim the remains of her son, Phillip Millen, who met his death at Kamela several days ago under the wheels of No. 5. The remains were identified beyond question and she left with them on No. 17 today for Portland.

**Pendletonians in Leslie's.**  
In the current issue of Leslie's Weekly appears a picture of the Pendleton delegation at the St. Paul winter carnival. The picture is of the parade and shows clearly a number of the Pendletonians riding with President L. W. Hill of the Great North-ern.

**Two Appendicitis Operations.**  
Mrs. Vivian Linsner of Pilot Rock, formerly Miss Vivian Sturtevant, underwent an operation for appendicitis this morning at St. Anthony's hospital. Marion O'Harra, son of Dr. O'Harra of Weston, underwent an operation Monday night for an acute attack of appendicitis, and is now recovering.

**Celebrated Birthdays.**  
At the Presbyterian mission today, Rev. and Mrs. William Wheeler entertained 40 men and women and their children in honor of the first birthday of one year old Phillip Wheeler, son of the Indian minister and his wife. A very pleasant time was had and various talks were given, one being by Rev. J. M. Cornelison.

**Perpetual Care for Graves.**  
The city council is considering fixing a fee for the perpetual care of graves at Oney cemetery by the sexton. A request came from Julius Levy asking what the charges would be for caring for the grave of the late Ben Selling for all time and this led to a discussion. Recorder Fitz Gerald states that several such requests have been received. In many cities such care is provided for.

**To Build Warehouse.**  
A permit was issued to G. I. La Dow this morning to build the new warehouse of H. G. Blydenstein & Co., to face upon Ash street. The building will be on the Northern Pacific Co.'s ground. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$1000. This is one of the improvements which will be made by Mr. Blydenstein for the manufacture of his food products on an extensive scale.

**Men Give Bonds for Permits.**  
Hereafter the city of Pendleton will enforce that provision of the building ordinance requiring persons taking out permits to use streets or sidewalks during a period of construction to give surety bonds for the protection of the city in the event of liabilities for damage caused by such use. This was the recommendation made last evening by the city attorney.

**Rainfall Below Normal.**  
The rainfall for the wet season in Pendleton is so far below normal according to the official records. The normal is 3.14 inches up to March 1, and the total this season has been 5.67. The February precipitation was almost up to normal. It was 1.42 and the normal is 1.47. The highest temperature of the month was on the 13th when the mercury rose to 63. The lowest was on the 23th when it fell to 14. There was six inches of snow during the month. There were eight days on which it fell. The clear days were eight partly cloudy and 11 cloudy.

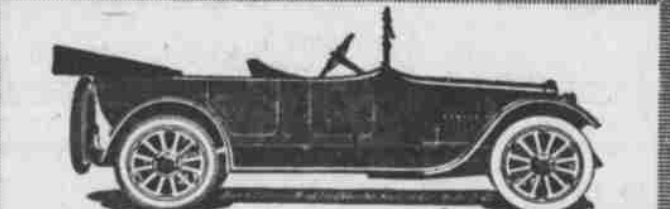
