TO FIND NITRATE PLANT SITE

Mission of Government Board Visting South and West.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—Secretaries Baker, Lane and Houston and a detail of army engineers composing the board which will determine the location of the \$20,000,000 government nitrate plant, left Washington for a tour of proposed sites in the southeast. The trip will be completed March 16 and afterward another tour will be made through the west.

President Wilson has instructed the board to select the site as soon as practicable, in view of the need for a nitrate factory in case of international complications.

SENATE ADOPTS CLOTURE RULE BY VOTE OF 76 TO 3

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The cloture amendment to the senate rules carried yesterday afternoon by a vote of 76 to 3.

Senators Gronna, La Follette and Sherman, republicans voted against it. The modified rule provides that a two-thirds majority may limit debate. The senate then went into executive session.

Senator McLean announced that he had prepared a resolution which he will offer today asking the president to call an extra session of congress March 20.

WILLARD SELECTED TO HEAD WAR COUNCIL

Daniel Willard, president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad who, according to Washington dispatches, has been tentatively selected to head the transportation division of the proposed war council, to be composed of President Wilson, members of his cabinet, military men and a large number of railroad officials, industrial and scientific experts. The war council probably would include the present national council of defense, the naval advisory board of inventors and the greatest gathering of great scientists for such a purpose in the history of the world. Samuel Gompers also would be a member, to handle the problem of providing labor to meet the military and industrial needs of the country in the event of war.

MANY FARMS TAKEN IN BORDMAN VICINITY

Twenty Four Tracts are Occupied in Umatilla West Extension.

BORDMAN, Ore., March 9.—Twenty-four new farms are the result of the first day opening of the west extension of the Umatilla project. Eighteen of these are 40-acre homesteads, and six are from the sales of private and railroad lands.

These new farms are within two miles of Bordman. The choice tract was won by a woman, Mrs. Alta Howard, of Bordman, who secured 49 acres at the end of Main street. The class of settlers are well-to-do farmers as a rule, and all have the funds necessary to develop their tracts.

Owing to the short time of 20 days which the opening was advertised, not all the homesteads were taken. Many inquiries could not be answered in time for the opening and it is thought by the reclamation officials that all will be taken within 30 days.

BELGIUM TO BE 'INDEPENDENT'

HAVRE, France, March 9.—The German government, according to information received here through confidential channels, is considering the publication of Germany's terms of peace. Under these terms Belgium would be declared independent, subject only to permanent German garrisons at Antwerp, Liege and Namur, and to the control by Germans of ports and railways. Belgium, under the terms, would have no national army, but would be policed by a gendarmerie.

ZEPPELINS ARE STILL BEING MANUFACTURED SAYS BERLIN REPORT

BERLIN, March 9.—(Wireless to United Press).—A high official vigorously denied that Germany has stopped making Zeppelins. He declared ample materials and plenty of workmen were available.

Several smallpox cases have been discovered and thousands vaccinated. Count Zeppelin's funeral arrangements are completed. He died from a complication of dysentery, mumps and inflammation of the lungs.

Much Activity on West Front. There is much general western front fighting. The French entered isolated trenches south of Ripont and captured a farm lowland. The Germans stormed Russian positions on the Roumanian frontier, capturing six hundred men.

President Wilson Assailed. The Tagblatt fiercely assailed President Wilson's changed attitude since making his senate peace speech. It pictured the United States as a "gleeful beneficiary of European civilization's deathbed," and charged that the president had abandoned Monroe's position. It called Bryan the president's chief opponent, quoting Bryan as saying "America is in danger of being dragged into the war unreasonably."

"MAKING FACES" IS NOVEL WAR ART

French Surgeon Replaces Eyes, Cheeks, Brows, Shot Away by Germans in Battle.

PARIS, March 9.—In all the world there are just an even dozen manufacturers of artificial eyes. Eleven make glass eyes. There is one each in New York, London and Venice. Of the other nine, four are in Germany and five in Paris. Among these there is a man apart, an artist, Dr. Robert Coulomb, who makes artificial eyes of crystal and enamel so startlingly like the living orb that at a distance of 12 feet from a patient providing the living eye is immobile, it is absolutely impossible to distinguish which can see the light of the sun.

Since his demobilization as an army surgeon, that his entire time could be devoted to a profession finding its clientele steadily increased by several thousand per cent. Dr. Coulomb has also performed extraordinary work in artificially rendering face-mutilated soldiers of France much like their unharmed countrymen at more than passing glance.

Dr. Coulomb is a professor of ophthalmic surgery, a graduate of the University of Paris, and a collector of renown who wears the Vrook de Guerre for bravery.

Previous to the war he had been the recipient of honors from the French government. Two generations before him had been manufacturers of artificial eyes. At the death of his father some years ago he abandoned eye surgery to take up the succession.

Dr. Coulomb does not and has not for some time performed any oculo-frontal, oculo-nasal, or oculo-symatoc surgery. He receives only such soldiers as patients as have been discharged from the hospital with a missing eye or healthy healed upper face wound.

NOW CANNED FRUITS HIGHER.
