Estate Is Appraised.

Will Have to Harvest.
H. J. Taylor, who visited his farm yesterday, declares that he will have to harvest 120 acres which he had sown to Red Russian wheat, the cold weather having frozen it out.

Wool has been received from L. M. Cargill who is trapping on Shoal creek in Canada, that he recently captured a female silver fox which had made way with one of his cranes in a trap. It is of extra good value, he says, and he will keep it for breeding purposes.

Auto Club May Affiliate.
At the meeting of the Umatilla County Auto Club last evening it was decided to take steps to affiliate with the new state-wide auto organization. President Rittner will go to Portland soon to take the matter up. Other matters of business were deferred last evening until some future date. The association has on hand \$116.

Auction to Be Held.
A farm auction is to be held next Wednesday at the John Laurilla place in Missouri Canyon, 15 miles northwest of Pendleton to sell horses, mules, cow, pigs, harness, a combine, other farm equipment and household goods. John Laurilla and J. B. Kasari are the owners and Col. W. F. Johnka will be auctioneer, with E. L. Smith as clerk.

Traps Meet Spokane.

If present weather conditions prevail tomorrow, the locals will have no weather alibi. More interest is being taken each Sunday and, as the men get practice, they are improving in their shooting.

To Start Sheepshearing.
J. C. Wattenburger, Echo sheep man, will start shearing work at the big plant at Echo on March 14. Alex Oliver of this place will be one of the crew. He has been shearing sheep for the last 45 years without having lost a season and worked on the first shearing machine used in Oregon. He claims to be the oldest sheep shearer in the state.
