BRUCE DENNIS TO DIRECT ROAD BOND ISSUE CAMPAIGN

Has Accepted Position of Executive Secretary; Was Formerly Editor of the La Grande Observer.

PORTLAND, March 21.—Bruce Dennis, formerly editor of the La Grande Observer and at one time chairman of the republican state central committee, yesterday notified Senator W. D. Wood, chairman of the legislative committee in charge of the campaign for the proposed \$5,000,000 road bond bill, that he would accept the position of executive secretary.

Members of the committee, Senator Wood, of Hillsboro; Senator E. D. Cusick, of Albany, and Representative Roy W. Ritzer, of Pendleton, voted unanimously last Sunday to offer the position to Mr. Dennis, but the latter did not decide to accept until yesterday.

Mr. Dennis left last week for his former home in La Grande, where he will adjust his affairs so that he may return to Portland tomorrow to establish the official headquarters for the campaign. As an ex-newspaperman of broad experience, Mr. Dennis will take active charge of the publicity campaign and will disseminate information to voters and good roads organizations in support of state.

Popular subscriptions in support of the proposed bond issue are being received by Senator Cusick of Albany, treasurer of the committee, to whom all checks should be mailed.

NEBRASKA TO HAVE EARLIEST BABY WEEK

California, Massachusetts and a Few Communities in Pennsylvania Will Also Hold Baby Weeks in Advance of General Date.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Nebraska is planning the earliest Baby Weeks of 1917, according to advices received by the Children's Bureau, California and Massachusetts and a few communities in Pennsylvania, and doubtless others who have not reported on their plans, will also hold Baby Week in advance of the general date. But in most of the 592 communities from which the Children's Bureau has already heard, Baby Week will be celebrated the first week in May.

In Nebraska and a few other states, the State Baby Week committees are suggesting that local campaigns be held during different weeks in different districts so that circuits may be arranged for speakers and exhibit material. Where such a plan is carried out, the state celebration will probably last after the 5th of May.

State-wide plans for Baby Week are already under way in at least 34 states representing every section of the country. Several state committees have selected some one phase of infant welfare work for special emphasis in this year's campaign. In the state of Washington, for example, many communities are testing the completeness of their birth records in advance of Baby Week. The importance of complete records is to be emphasized also in Illinois, in Iowa in New Hampshire and in Ohio.

The Delaware campaign is to be devoted to the prevention of infantile paralysis. North Dakota calls attention to the needs of children under the school age. Kansas, which held the record among all the states for the largest number of local Baby Weeks in 1916, is emphasizing three needs in this year's plans: Complete birth registration throughout the state; instruction of mothers in the principles of baby care; and better understanding of the care that expectant mothers ought to have.

The details of local plans developed later than the state plans, and these are just beginning to come to the Children's Bureau. It seems that local committees are commonly choosing one or more specific purposes in order that the campaign may have permanent results, even in states for which no specific program is suggested.

The Children's Bureau has a bulletin on the planning and carrying out of Baby-Week campaigns and other material of assistance to local committees, which it is glad to send upon request.
