### MAKES 29TH RESCUE TO STOP A SUICIDE

Man's Leap Off Pier Fails But Man Who Dives From a Ferryboat Succeeds.

NEW YORK, March 28.—William Faraher, out of work and despondent jumped off Pier 1, the Battery, yesterday afternoon in an effort to take his life. He failed because Peter McNeil, dockmaster, jumped in after him and fished him out. It was McNeil's twenty-ninth rescue.

"Well, I won't get any thanks for coming home, will," asserted McNeil. He went home to dry out and Faraher went to Bellevue Hospital, a prisoner.

An unidentified man who jumped from the Staten Island ferryboat Queen, bound to St. George, on her 7:28 p. m. trip, was more successful. He died.

He leaped from the upper deck when the ferry boat was passing Hobbs reef, and a lifeboat manned by Mate Alfred Squires and Frank McCumbridge and John Campbell, deckhands, went after him. They disappeared and after an hour the ferryboat proceeded.

Some time later the rescue party set and cold, was picked up by the tugboat George Kirkman and brought to the Battery. They found no trace of the suicide.
