MAIL CLERKS MAY HAVE HOMES HERE

Ten New Families in Prospect as Result of Shift in Schedule.

Ten railway mail clerks now living in Portland and working on the O-W. R. & N. east of this city may have headquarters in Pendleton in the future if they desire. If they do not live here they will be obliged to "deadhead" from Portland to Pendleton and from this city back to Portland.

The men affected are those handling mail on trains 18 and No. 5. These trains handle no mail between Pendleton and Portland. Consequently Pendleton becomes the logical place for the men to live. As all the men have homes in Portland, they are said to be reluctant to move at present. Consequently they will be allowed to "deadhead" back and forth on their own time. This will mean two days of useless travel for each man every time he goes out upon his run. Under the circumstances it is quite probable that most of the men will move to Pendleton to live as soon as they find a change convenient. The order has been in effect since March 15.

His grandfather has been a member of the medical reserve for years and is now on duty at Fort Adams, Newport, Rhode Island.

Mrs. King, eldest member of the Pendleton chapter, has already seen the United States go through two wars, the Civil war and Spanish war and is ready to do her part to help if another conflict comes. She wishes to live to be 100 years old and loves her country better the older she grows. Mrs. King is an expert with the knitting needle and will be of assistance to the local chapter in knitting sponges for the Red Cross.

HOME IS DAMAGED \$1500 BY FLAMES

J. P. McMann's Property Occupied by J. K. Thompson is Partially Burned Last Night.

The J. P. McMann residence property at the corner of Madison and Wilson streets, occupied by the family of J. K. Thompson, the druggist, was last night partially burned in a fire that resulted in damage estimated at \$1500. The fire was discovered about 7:45 by Mrs. Gideon Brown and the alarm was turned in by Walter Adams. When the fire department arrived the flames had spread from the kitchen and pantry into the attic and were breaking through the roof. With a little more start, the fire would have had a headway hard to check. The fire did not get into the front rooms but the whole house was drenched with water.

The Thompson family was at a moving picture theater at the time. A fire had been left in the kitchen range and indications are that the fire started from that. Both house and contents were insured.
