FIFTY PER CENT OF ATHENA WHEAT LAND MUST BE RESEDED

Estimate is Made by Mayor Watts; Other Farmers Place Percentage as High as 70; Lack of Warm March Rains Held Responsible.

Fully fifty per cent of the wheat land about Athena that was seeded last fall will have to be reseeded this spring, according to Mayor Homer I. Watts of Athena who was here yesterday afternoon. Other farmers of that locality place the percentage as high as seventy.

Mayor Watts, who is himself a farmer, bases his estimate upon his own observations made Sunday during a trip over the farm country. Owing to unfavorable weather he only succeeded in getting in a half section of land last fall and of this

he will have to reseed 175 acres, he states. Practically every farmer of that locality is reworking in whole or in part. Mr. Watts attributes the damage principally to the lack of warm March rains to soften up the hard crust which prevented the sprouting grain from pushing through.
