This hard-hearted wheat is first carefully cleansed and then ground up, skin and all, into the coarse-flour from which macaroni is made.

The resulting paste or dough is shaped by special machinery into macaroni, spaghetti, vermicelli or noodles.

Nature's responsibility for macaroni ends with the wheat in the field—from there it is man-made, from there on it will bear watching.

For macaroni, like any other food, can be manufactured in any one of a dozen ways, and under any one of many different factory-conditions.

We would better be a little more particular about the macaroni we buy—it is more susceptible to unfavorable, neighborhood-factory uncleanness than bread or cereals. Looking for the right name on the package, is frequently a necessary and always a wise precaution.
