### IRISHMAN HURLS FOR KAISER STRUCK BY GERMAN-AMERICAN

He Explains in Police Court He Was Drunk—Both He and His Assailant Fined.

ST. LOUIS, April 12.—Daniel Kavanaugh of 4496 Penrose street, who was born in Ireland, waved his hat and yelled: "Hoorah for the kaiser," whereupon Harry Wulfers of 1924 Mallinckrodt street, whose father was a German, struck Kavanaugh in the

eye. The encounter took place on the rear platform of a Lee avenue car yesterday.

Both were in Judge Sanders' police court today on peace disturbance charges. While holding a handkerchief to his eye, Kavanaugh said, "I'm as good an American as anyone, but I had been drinking and was trying to be funny."

Judge Sanders ruled that Kavanaugh was wrong in cheering for the kaiser, but he also held Wulfers was wrong in hitting a drunken man. He fined each \$10.

### STUDENTS WILL BE HELD READY FOR WAR

War Department Plans Three Months' Course of Preparation Before Commissions Are Given.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—Students in universities in the west should refrain from enlisting until the full plans of the war department have been completed, Major General J. Franklin Bell announced last night. In a telegram sent to Dr. Benjamin Ide Wheeler, president of the University of California, General Bell urged that that portion of the university student body available for military duty should be held until. Tentative plans of the war department, he said, contemplated entrance of the senior classes of universities in the three months' course preparatory to commissions and he added that it is probable junior classes will also be admissible to such camps.

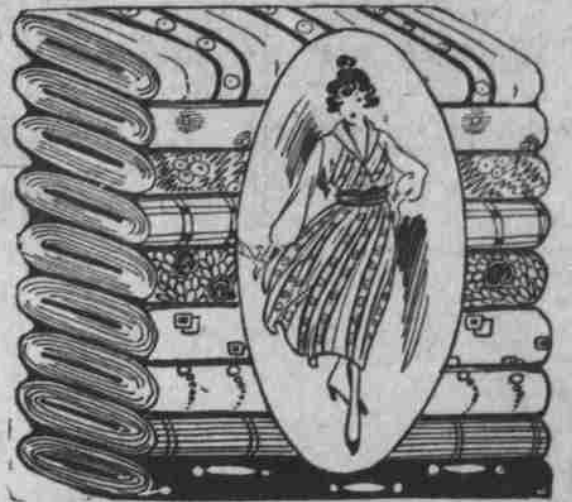

### ONE-THIRD OF W. U. MEN EXPECTED TO ENLIST

Fifty Students Have Already Joined Coast Artillery Corps.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 12.—At least 200 students, practically one-third of the men of the University, will answer the call to arms in case their country needs them, is the estimate of Karl W. Outhank, secretary to President H. L. Campbell, who has kept in close touch with student opinion. Already 50 students have enlisted in the Eugene company of the coast artillery, while a number have forwarded their applications to Washington, D. C., signifying their willingness to join the volunteer officers'

training camp in case of war. This officers' camp was authorized by a recent act of congress, and permits college men after thorough training, and passing of the examinations, to enter the volunteer force as second lieutenants.

A University drill squad of 50 men has been organized, and has begun active drill. Instruction in bandaging wounds and first aid is being given the men by Trainer William Hayward.

War will hold up indefinitely the new athletic field, which was to have been built next year, according to A.

R. Tiffany, registrar of the University. All intercollegiate games will be cancelled. Mobilization of the second company, Coast Artillery, will take from college activity both Nicholas Jastreun, of Tacoma, Wash., president of the associated student body, and Ernest Watkins, Bandon, Oregon, vice-president of the student body, and will please Miss Jennie Huggins, Portland, the present secretary, at the head of the organization. In this event it will be the first time that a woman has held the office in the history of the University.
