## PLANS FOR 3000 SHIPS APPROVED

Vessels Will be Built in Next Three Years to Transport Food and Supplies to the Allies.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Plans for three thousand wooden vessels to be built in the next three years were completed and approved by the president. The boats will be used to transport food and supplies to the allies.

The government shipping board called for a hundred and fifty thousand lumbermen and woodworkers to begin work immediately. Each ship will be manned by a trained gun crew and equipped with anti-submarine guns and wireless. Commencing November first three ships daily will be put into service. Seventy per cent of the ships will be built on the Pacific coast. The vessels will be taken through the canal loaded with lumber.

### HELIX BOY MAKES RECORD AT O. A. C.

Arthur Ferguson Finishes Agricultural Course in 2 1/2 Years.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, April 12.—Arthur E. Ferguson of Helix made the record of finishing his course in Agriculture in two and one-half years and then having eight more credits than necessary for graduation. Mr. Ferguson leaves college now to begin work as farm manager of a large grain and stock farm near Condon, the work beginning April 14 with a salary of \$50 per month and living expenses. This farm comprises 1200 acres of pasture, 1000 acres of wheat and has 300 sheep, 100 horses, also cattle and hogs. Mr. Ferguson had eleven years of experience on his father's farm, nine years of which he worked on a combine. In college life he was a member of the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, a member of the college band and one of the directors of the student co-operation store.
