I was raised in St. Louis, Missouri—on apple pie and other things.

East Indies, Gen. Johannes Benedictus van Heuts, formerly governor general of those colonies, advocates the building of a fleet of large submarines, instead of a small battle fleet, and the organization of a native militia army in the islands.

A small battle fleet, he declared, would be inferior to that of Holland's potential enemies. Instead of confining the main plan of defense to the island of Java alone, he asserted, "we must and will defend the entire archipelago." Every island of importance, he said, could be stubbornly defended against assault if an efficient native militia army be organized.

ROME GIVES OVATION TO PAGE
Crowds Acclaim United States As New Ally.
ROME, April 12.—Great crowds headed by bands marched last night

to the residence of Thomas Nelson Page, the American ambassador where they enthusiastically acclaimed President Wilson and the United States as a new ally. The ambassador and Mrs. Page appeared with the embassy staff in a balcony from which waved American and Italian flags.

Ambassador Page said it was impossible for him to express the profound feeling stirred in him by the great demonstration in appreciation of the step taken by his country. America and Italy always have been allies, he said, "in the cause of liberty, which now is imperiled by the forces of reaction and autocracy."

FLAG Famine is ON.
