FIRST AMERICAN ARMED SHIP TO BE SUNK BY U-BOAT



S.S. AZTEC

The American steamer Aztec, which, according to dispatches, has been sunk by a German submarine

off Brazil, France, with a possible loss of twenty-eight lives, becoming the first American armed ship to be sent

to the bottom by a U-boat. Nineteen members of the crew of the freighter were rescued by a French patrol. Twenty-eight are missing.

LIP AND LEG ULCER AFFECTS HOGS, SHEEP

Disease is Playing Havoc With Herd and Flocks in Oregon.

EUGENE, Ore., April 21.—A disease commonly known as the lip and leg ulcer is playing havoc among the hogs and sheep of various sections of the state, says N. S. Robb, county agricultural agent. "The disease confines itself to these two classes of livestock and is especially bad in sheep. It spreads much more rapidly in sheep than in hogs and unless its appearance in the flock is checked by the isolation of the victims, the results are bad. "The disease first appears in the form of lesions around the mouth and on the legs in the region of the

hoof top. These lesions reach an excessive growth and develop a proud-flesh condition. In lambs and young pigs the mouths are so affected that the animals cannot suck and starving results. This disease is appearing and causing much loss in other sections of the state."

SEVERE WEATHER IS CAUSING MUCH DAMAGE

Losses Among Cattle and Sheep in the Northern Rocky Mountain-Grass

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Severe weather is causing heavy losses among cattle and sheep in the northern Rocky mountain region, according to reports to the forestry service.

The loss of sheep in Wyoming, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Nevada will be unusually heavy and may reach 50 per cent, it was said today. Sheep generally are reported in poor condition and a light lamb and wool crop is predicted.

Heavy cattle losses are in prospect in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming and stockmen fear that short grain and hay supplies will mean the death of many more animals before warm weather.

In the Pacific coast states and in the southwest the situation is said to be much better.

National forest supervisors have been directed to open all preserves to livestock earlier this year than usual.

APPEAL IS MADE TO HEAD OFF NEW STRIKES

Field Marshal Hindenburg Recognizes That Population is Hit.

LONDON, April 21.—A message sent by Field Marshal von Hindenburg to General Groener, head of the German munitions department, with

reference to strikes by industrial communities, has been received here by wireless from Berlin. Field Marshal von Hindenburg says he recognizes that the population has been hit hard by the reduction of the bread ration, but that undoubtedly the increase in meat and the regular delivery of potatoes will compensate therefor. The field marshal said:

"Every strike, however small, may be the means of an unjustifiable weakening of our defensive force and is an inexcusable crime against the fighting forces, especially the men in the trenches who bleed in consequence."
