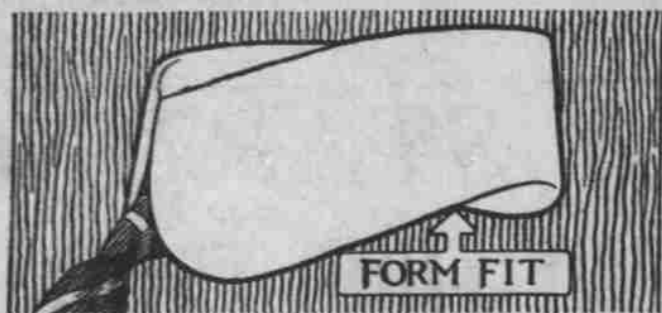

**FILMS EXPLODE; SIX KILLED.**

Score suffer minor injuries in Accident at Indianapolis.

said to have resulted from an explosion of moving picture films in the office of a film exchange in the Colfax office building and apartment house in the downtown district here last night.

The dead are: Dr. Martha E. Keller, a physician; Harry Rowland, 18, an employe of the Cole Motor company; Leona Griffin, 18; Robert Griffin, 14; Mrs. M. Griffin, mother of Leona and Robert, an unidentified woman.

The flames spread to the Linden and Royal hotels, but the guests escaped and damage to the hotels was slight. The loss to the Colfax building is estimated at \$45,000.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., April 22.—After walking through the roughest part of Curry county, one hundred miles from Gold Beach to Grants Pass, Joseph Wheaton, 17, an orphan, today is one of Uncle Sam's soldiers.

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 22.—One thousand deaf men—all experts with the rifle—will be a part of Colonel Roosevelt's proposed volunteer division if J. P. Meagher, instructor in the Washington state school for the deaf has his way. He has written the colonel for permission to recruit a thousand "sons of silence," whom, he says, he can have ready for service in four months.

TACOMA, April 22.—A "give-dollar-a-week to buy war bonds" campaign is on here today under the direction of the Tacoma Rotary Club.

OLYMPIA, April 22.—State Commissioner Benson today is initiating the cooperation of all publications in Washington in a statewide campaign of agriculture preparedness. State experts will prepare 600-word stories on the most approved way to plant and harvest crops suitable to both eastern and western Washington.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 22.—Having sworn his intention of renouncing his allegiance to Kaiser Wilhelm, yet denied citizenship in the United States for the present, August Voger, of this city, is today a man without a country. He was refused final papers because of the 100-year-old law which provided that an alien enemy cannot be granted citizenship.

BEND, Ore., April 22.—The United States got into a war with Germany without R. S. Bothwell, a homesteader living 25 miles from La Pine hearing about it, but as soon as he did happen to get the news he walked with snowshoes to Bend and enlisted in the navy. Today he is on his way to San Francisco. Between the time he heard of the war and his departure from Bend by train, he walked 75 miles.
