## LIVE NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 12.—Throughout Washington tomorrow will be observed as Young Men's Christian Association day. The purpose of the day is to secure aid in the association's campaign to finance work in the army and navy. "One of the outstanding features of every recent war has been the work of the Young Men's Christian association among the enlisted men," reads Active Governor Louis Hart's statement to the public. "On the Mexican border last summer, even before the regimental camps were pitched, the association had its quarters up and ready for occupancy. Now that we are entering the greatest war of all time, making ready to raise the largest army in our history, the association is facing a line of work before which all its previous like activities seem trifling. To carry on this warfare work, a fund of \$3,000,000 will be needed and of this amount \$40,500 has been apportioned to the state of Washington. The state association has undertaken a definite plan for raising this amount and in connection with the plan, Sunday, May 13 has been fixed as Army and Navy Y. M. C. A. Day." Plans have been completed for observing the day throughout the state.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12.—The several thousand city gardeners in Portland will parade tonight. Clad in their working clothes and carrying hoes, shovels, rakes and spades they will march through downtown streets in one of the most unique processions in the history of Portland. It will be a poor man's parade. No automobiles will be allowed, and only those wearing old clothes can take part in it. Following the parade a patriotic program will be given. The Citizen's Unification league, in charge of both parade and program, announces that the object of the demonstration is to promote harmony among loyal citizens and native-born citizens and to further the spirit of patriotism.

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., May 12.—President Wilson was re-elected and the United States declared war on Germany since G. W. Davis and William Butler last heard the news of the outside world. They are mountaineers and for six months were snowbound. Today they came to Cottage Grove and to their astonishment heard of the entry of the United States into the war.

TILLAMOOK, Ore., May 12.—Interest in the great halibut banks off the Oregon coast, said to be the greatest in the world, is being awakened here. Today the Delta, the largest craft which has yet been sent from this port to engage in deep-sea fishing, today is at work somewhere off the coast. One or two craft have been working out from Astoria for some time, but more extensive fishing is planned and more boats will be put to work.

New Company's Authority to Write Them Unsettled.  
OLYMPIA, May 9.—The Mutual Union Insurance company, recently incorporated by jitney men in the state for the purpose of writing their own \$2500 surety bonds required by law, has been issued a certificate by Commissioner Fishback to write accident, health, liability and motor car insurance, but whether the company can write surety bonds under the state charter is a question that has been submitted to Attorney General Tanner for determination. This means that for the present jitney bonds can not be written. The company has 221 applications for liability insurance policies of \$2500 each.
