What the Picture Theaters Have to Tell You.

Big Dramatic Success Seen the Last Time Today.

The story of "Apartment 29" tends to prove that no man can tell beforehand what he or any other man will do under given circumstances. The framed-up adventures of a dramatic human being would possibly act in real life as did the hero of a new play, form the greatest portion of the action of "Apartment 29." Earle Williams, as the dramatic critic, is framed up by the author of the play in much the same manner as was the hero of the play. The critic is caught up in a whirlpool of happenings that cause him to act just as he said no rational man would, and in addition to disproving his own assertions, the critic gets a bump on the head that wasn't in the plot, and also becomes engaged to one of the plotters.

The Empress Scores Big Hit at Cozy.

Holbrook Blinn, the famous Broadway star, and Doris Kenyon, the beautiful little motion picture actress who has been featured in a number of photoplays, co-starred on the screen in the promise of the manager of the Cozy theater.

He is negotiating with the famous Pathe Company for a booking on "The Empress," a strong drama featuring these two well known players, who are supported by a cast including William Morse and Lyne Donaldson.

"The Empress" was directed by Madam Blanche, who is one of the few really great women directors in the picture business.

LIVING COST UP IN SOUTH AFRICA
Commission Has Been Deeply Probing Conditions.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—Commodore A. Wakefield, Port Elizabeth, says: Recently a commission was appointed to investigate the report upon the increased cost of living in the various centers in South Africa. The report of this commission gave the increase at Port Elizabeth as 17 per cent above normal. Since the report was published further advances have taken place. The price of food products generally have always been high in South Africa. Being a food-importing country, freight and duty adds considerably to the cost in the country whence exported.

At a recent meeting of the local chamber of commerce the advance in prices was the subject of discussion. Some maintained that prices of products locally produced had been unnecessarily advanced.

Unless shipping conditions improve prices will be still higher. This condition may not be without its advantages, as efforts are being made to supply articles that have been in competition with local products.

U. S. GUNNERS FIRE AT DIVER
Submarine Disappears on Attack by American Lance.

NEW YORK, May 11.—An armed American line steamer which arrived here from a European port reported that her gun crew fired six shots at a German submarine off the coast of Ireland on May 2. The undersaw boat immediately submerged, and it was not possible to determine whether any of the shots took effect.

The periscope of the submarine was sighted about 6 p. m. and the American vessel immediately swung around to afford the gunners an opportunity for accurate aim. The undersaw craft disappeared simultaneously with the firing of the first shot, it was said, and did not reappear. The American ship then proceeded on her course.

ENROLL EMBRYO OFFICERS.
Quarters Will Be So Full That Trunks Are Barred.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—The first unit of the 2500 candidates for commissions in the army whose training will begin at the Presidio here will be enrolled tomorrow. It will consist of 385 men. Nearly 100 reserve officers already volunteered will be included.

The barracks will be so crowded with the 2500 student officers that trunks have been officially banned. Each candidate will be limited to one suitcase.
