McDonald Estate \$27,000.

Duncan McDonald, who died recently, left an estate valued at \$27,000, according to the petition filed by his wife for the appointment of Daniel McDonald and E. J. Murphy as joint administrators. The estate consists of a section of land in township 1, N. R. 32, valued at \$24,000, a one-sixth interest in the estate of his father, Neil McDonald, valued at \$1500 and personal property valued at \$1500. His heirs are his wife and two small children. He left no will.

\$100,000 ESTATE DIVIDED.

4 N. E. 32, his daughter, Eva L. Campbell, is bequeathed the use, control and income of 520 acres in township 4 N., R. 32, his daughter, Iva M. Stinson, the same of 320 acres in the same township and range, and his daughter, Frankie F. Kilgore, is bequeathed the use, control and income of 1140 acres in the same township and range. At the death of the testator her estate is to be divided share and share alike among her children and, if she is survived by none, then her estate is to revert to her sisters and brother share and share alike.

Never to Mortgage Property. The will specifically provides that the heirs shall pay promptly all taxes from the income of the property and that none of them shall ever mortgage, alienate or encumber the property bequeathed. It is specified that no lease for more than five years shall be given and that all debts owing to deceased by his beneficiaries shall be subtracted from their share. In case any of his heirs decide to contest the will, it is specified that he or she shall be cut off with \$10 and that the others shall receive the balance.

All of the balance of the estate, including the 1600 acres purchased last fall and the personal property of deceased, is to be divided share and share alike among the five children. The will provides that John T. Osis shall be executor without bonds and that he shall employ J. H. Raley as his attorney and shall not pay more than \$250 for settling the estate. The will is 11 pages long contains 16 sections and is witnessed by four well known farmers, Marion Jack, Frank Rogers, Frank Gori and Tom Thompson.

KELLY PLEADS NOT GUILTY.

REF OAKS, Iowa, May 15.—A formal plea of not guilty was entered by Rev. Lon George Kelly's attorney following the reading of the indictment charging him with beating out the brains of Joe Moore, his wife and four children, and two daughters of Joe Stillinger in the famous Villages axe murders June 9, 1912. Kelly, accompanied by his wife, was remanded to jail.

STRIKING BUS DRIVERS RESUME THEIR WORK

LONDON, May 14.—Striking bus drivers have resumed work pending negotiations that are expected to settle all differences. The drivers' action follows an appeal from the government, showing the strike delayed workers reaching the munitions plants.

SETTLEMENT TERMS READY.

LONDON, May 15.—Premier Lloyd George will transmit the terms of settlement of the Irish question developed by the government to the Irish leaders tomorrow. Chancellor of the Exchequer Bonar Law announced in the house of commons.

CROPS RUINED AND BRIDGES TORN OUT

High Water Does Serious Damage in Eastern Oregon and Washington; Crest of Flood Yet to Come.

LA GRANDE, Ore., May 15.—Crumbling like tinder when the abutments gave way, the county bridge at Island City, three miles from here, dropped into the Grand Ronde river this evening at 5:30 and now rests on the bottom of the turbulent stream.

The new county bridge at the park, two miles above Island City is also threatened. It is the newest and finest bridge in the county, and the Island City structure ranked next.

Some estimates place the total land under water in the Grand Ronde valley following recent high floods and the present inundations at 20,000 acres.

HEPPNER, May 15.—(Special.)—Damage from the cloudburst here Friday probably will reach \$100,000. Crops, roads, bridges and fences are ruined, and wires are down. Some stock was killed.

DAYTON, Wash., May 15.—(Special.)—A heavy cloudburst did thousands of dollars' worth of damage in Columbia county Saturday. In Davis Hollow one farmer lost eight head of horses and two colts when the stable was torn from its foundation and carried down a gulch in a raging torrent.

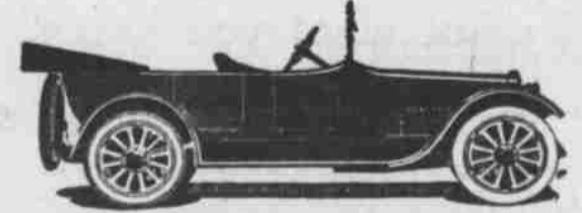
