TONIGHT CLOSSES REVIVAL MEETING

GREAT FAREWELL SERVICE WILL BE HELD AT HAPPY CANON.

Dr. Henry's subject last night, "Pendleton and the Eternal Round-Up," a Masterful Exposition.

"Pendleton and the Eternal Round-Up" was the subject of Dr. Henry's address last evening. "There are few towns with the reputation accorded to Pendleton, which has been gained through the unique entertainment given in your annual Round-Up. In my text is revealed God's Round-up; 'For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, and give an account of the deeds done in the body whether they be good or bad.' This is the ultimate Round-Up at which every son and daughter of Adam's race will be present.

The question of the general judgment cannot be created or disestablished according to human reason or philosophy. The Bible is the only source of information.

That the word of God is specific in teaching that the judgment is an absolute and unerring certainty is clear. Further it is necessary to justify the consciences of men and to recall the social iniquities. At that time Jesus Christ will be the center of attraction. He will judge all men. In that we ought to be grateful that it is not a Herod or Pilate, but a just Judge. While he is Judge he reveals in his character the inflexible standard by which we shall be judged.

The nature of the judgment, and the disclosures made will be absolutely based upon conduct. This will be a universal experience. In these meetings we have only touched the fringe of the population of Pendleton, but in the great Round-Up every individual without an exception will be there.

There is a finality implied in this teaching. No new witnesses or appeal can be made. Jesus Christ is the supreme Judge. The verdict is fixed eternally. There are those who seem to think that there is a kind of moral alchemy in death which will do something for them which life has never done. But death will change nothing but the perishable.

A man who carries insurance upon himself, property, business, etc., is counted sagacious—he plays safe. But why should not similar motives impel a man to spiritual security? The religion of Jesus Christ alone can fit one for the eternal Round-Up.

Tonight will be the great farewell service. Let us give those faithful messengers of God a fitting appreciation for the good work done. The subject will be "The Nightmare of Lost Opportunity."
