Philadelphia of Prominence Arrested for Peculation Covering Seven Years.

PHILADELPHIA, May 16.—James Williamson, 42, well known in society circles of this city, former secretary of the Pennsylvania company for insurance on lives and granting annuities, has been arrested. He is charged with misappropriating funds while in the employ of the company.

The sum named in the warrant is \$35,000. Officials of the state banking department at Harrisburg said the amount was between \$50,000 and \$75,000.

A statement issued by the company says:

"A defalcation through forgery by a former employee has been discovered. The amount is large, but a substantial part of it will be recovered through employee's liability insurance and from other sources."

According to the state banking officials, Williamson, who is 34 years old, abstracted securities for seven years, bonds being taken from estates of women, one of whom missed \$250,000. All the losses have been replaced in kind. It was stated by the state banking officials.

Williamson is a member of the First Troop, Philadelphia city cavalry, which includes members of the most prominent families in Philadelphia. In his school days he was a widely known amateur carman and was active in the organization of the American Rowing association, which annually has conducted the American Henley regatta here.

The accused man waived a hearing today and was held in \$25,000 bail for trial. Bail was furnished by a surety company. Williamson resigned his position last October and has since been engaged in business here.
