PORTLAND, May 21.—Very serious decrease in the runs of livestock was shown at North Portland over Sunday, this being full confirmation of recent forecasts in this paper.

There was a further advance of 25c in tops in the swine division of the North Portland yards for the week's opening, one lot of extra good staff commanding \$14.25, or the highest price on record for the open market here.

Over Sunday the total run of swine at North Portland was but 1754 head, including a full run of stockers from California. Last Monday morning the run totaled 2335 head, and a year ago today the showing was 2785 head.

While tops were quoted at an advance of 25c for the day, the general market was 15 to 25c up.

NEW STYLE IN ARMY UNIFORM  
War Department May Adopt suits With More "Swagger"

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Uncle Sam's army officers may wear a new service uniform, if a style now being considered by the war department is approved. The uniform is the one to be worn by the officers who will accompany the Rout commission to Russia.

The coat or tunic resembles closely that worn by British officers visiting this country. Instead of the present collar, which fits tightly about the neck, the new collar falls over with lapels and stripes to designate the service branch of the officer will be suspended from the lapels. It was explained that the new uniform will give officers more "swagger." The uniforms worn to Russia will be cloth heavier than khaki and resembling wool. They will be olive drab and will have trench belts.
