FOUNDATION TAX EXEMPT
New York Court Also Frees Hygiene Bureau From Levy.
NEW YORK, May 18.—The appellate division of the supreme court today ruled that the Rockefeller Foundation and the bureau of social hygiene are charitable corporations and are exempt from a state transfer tax.
The decision effects bequests of \$433,592 to the Rockefeller foundation and \$75,000 to the bureau of social hygiene, made by the late Mrs. Laura R. Rockefeller, wife of John D. Rockefeller.

Whereas, the City Surveyor of the City of Pendleton did on the 23rd day of May, 1917, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council file in the office of the Recorder of the City of Pendleton, certain maps and specifications for an improvement of the following named street in said city, viz: Perkins Avenue from the North line of Raley Street to the South line of Washington Street, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the percentage of the total cost of improvement, which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement, and
Whereas, the council has examined such maps and specifications and estimates and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work, and
Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Common Council, properly to be included within such improvement districts, and no property is included therefrom, which should properly be included therein, and
Whereas, the improvement of the herein above described portions of Perkins Avenue with Gravel Bitulithic pavement is at this time necessary, therefore be it,
Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve Perkins Avenue from the North line of Raley Street to the South line of Washington Street by paving the same with gravel bitulithic pavement, which is a portion of the intersection of said Perkins Avenue with Jackson Street which is not to be paved; such pavement to be 45 feet from curb to curb and to be constructed and the surface thereof to be finished up on the established grade of said street and the street to have curbed and gutters and all other things in accordance with and as shown in the plans and specifications for such improvement, which said plans and specifications are on file with the Recorder of said City, and be it further resolved, that the engineer's estimates of the probable total cost of such improvement, which said estimates and estimates were made and prepared by Geary Kimbrell, City Surveyor of said City, in the month of April, 23rd day of May, 1917, and the City of Pendleton on the 23rd day of May, 1917, be and they are hereby adopted and approved, and be it
Further Resolved, that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and liability on the lots and parcels of land and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvements and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land, so specially benefited by such improvements shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof, and be it
Further Resolved, that an assessment district is hereby created to be known as "Assessment District No. 53," embracing the property benefited and to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include all lots and parcels of land bounded and described as follows, to-wit:
RIT NO. 53, SOMETIMES CALLED IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 53, commencing at the N. E. corner of Lot 12, Block 9, Livermore's Addition to the Town, now City of Pendleton, Oregon, from S. 1 deg. 35 min. E. through the center of Block 9 of said Livermore's Addition and Block 5 of Raley's Addition 670 feet to the S. E. corner of Lot 7 of said Block 5, thence S. 88 deg. 3 min. W. 280 feet to the S. W. corner of Lot 6 of Block 10 upon which said Block 10, thence S. 88 deg. 3 min. W. 280 feet to the N. E. corner of Lot 1 of Block 4 of said Livermore's Addition, thence S. 88 deg. 3 min. E. 280 feet to the N.
