CIVIL EVACUATION OF TRIESTE IS ORDERED; AUSTRIANS FALL BACK

MAKES FIRST SPEECH MISS J. RANKIN GAME GETS MUCH APPLAUSE

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Jeanette Rankin, of Montana, game, but a little nervous, made her maiden speech in the house this afternoon. She introduced, discussed and had passed in less than five minutes amid vociferous applause, an amendment to the Lever bill providing that as much as possible the food conservation work be done by women.

Reserves are Massed for Last Desperate Defense; Supplies Hurried to Inland Cities.

TOTAL ENEMY LOSES 60,000

ROME, May 28.—Austria is massing every reserve for a last desperate defense of Trieste. Meanwhile the troops are gradually retiring before the irresistible Italians. Battlefield estimates put the total of Austrian losses, dead, wounded and missing since May 14 at 60,000. The enemy is fighting bravely under heavy fire. It is reported all Austrian reserves are concentrated near Trieste. The civil evacuation of the city has been ordered. Supplies were hurried to inland cities. Prisoners declare the Austrian defense is handicapped because of lack of reserves. The Italian front has been drained to reinforce the dwindling forces on the western and Italian fronts. It is declared Teutonic commanders are apprehensive over what the Russians might do.

Prisoners declare they were ordered to resist the Italian advance at all costs. All are unanimous in declaring the hurricane of artillery fire was appalling in its infliction of losses. Desperate and repeated counter attacks reported today indicated the military experts believe that the Austrians have not given up hope of capturing the Vedice sector.

Blazing Fire Sprays Used.

PARIS, May 28.—A German raid made with blazing fire sprays near Mont Meud was repulsed. It is officially stated.

Night Attacks Reported.

LONDON, May 28.—German night attacks northwest of Cherbourg and south of Lens were repulsed. Heavy reported. The enemy suffered severe losses.

Lines Declared Unbroken.

VIENNA, May 28.—The defenders lines are unbroken. It is officially declared. Thirteen thousand prisoners have been taken since the beginning of the Bosno battle it is stated.

238 KILLED BY TORNADO

CHICAGO, May 28.—Two hundred and thirty-eight are known dead and 1122 are injured, many fatally, according to the latest count of the victims of a series of tornadoes sweeping Illinois, Indiana and parts of Kansas and Kentucky. Thousands are destitute and homeless.
