OBJECTS TO ROAD BONDS.

Pendleton, Ore., May 21. Editor East Oregonian: Heretofore the state highway commission has expended its greatest efforts on the Columbia river highway, and the present bill indicates that road will be its first thought, if the

bonds carry. That road, beginning at the Tillamook county line, running north along the coast to Seaside and Astoria, thence following the bank of the Columbia river easterly for several hundred miles, is not a military road; because, it is too close to deep water, which would enable an enemy's fleet to approach and destroy ammunition and commissary trains. Military engineers say decidedly, that a military road must be 10 or 15 miles from deep water and ought to have an intervening ridge between the road and deep water. The proposed road is badly exposed for 200 miles or more, hence is in no sense a military road.

It is not an agricultural road; because, it has water, either the ocean or the Columbia river, between 100 and 400 miles on one side, and on the other much of that will never have any agricultural value.

This road is about as far away from the large, fertile farming sections of Oregon as they could have put it and still stay in the state of Oregon. Had they sought a location for the road

where it would consume money fast and do the general taxpayer and the farmer absolutely no good, nowhere in Oregon could they have found a more suitable location. It avoids farms. It seeks scenery. Along the whole western 300 miles of that road there is no place where can be found in one body 10,000 acres of land large enough and fertile enough for farming. It is a scenic and pleasure road, wholly and solely.

It is very expensive to build. One-fourth mile in Hood River county has already cost \$47,000 and is not yet completed. Another mile there will cost nearly if not quite \$275,000. To construct the whole Columbia river highway, giving it a "permanent hard surface," will cost between \$1,000,000 and \$12,000,000 (depending on expense of building and location, it is not all located yet).

Nothing can be left from the \$5,000,000 unless they do very poor work, which will not prove durable. But should they save something over by cheaper work than Jackson county, under the bill, has a right to have its share of Pacific highway both graded and paved. So that, notwithstanding their good intentions, there can not be a cent left for Umatilla county. So, should the bonds carry, after

money derived from them are spent, we will be in this condition:

We will be paying interest on borrowed money with which we built the road. We will be paying, by taxation, between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 annually for repairs and maintenance of money for roads for and among farmers than we have now. Our taxes will be still higher. Bonds always raise taxes—no exception to that rule.

So passage of this measure would make taxes more burdensome and put the good roads which all want, still farther away.

Every taxpayer should vote "no" on the \$5,000,000 bond bill.

That is fair, and that representation the women have a right to ask, and indeed to demand. Under the new law all electors are qualified to vote. The tax requirement was wiped out by the last legislature. I have learned that Mrs. C. S. Terpening will be a candidate. I know her to be a worthy, capable woman, experienced in educational work, herself a teacher for many years. I am confident that together we can do more for the schools of Pendleton than can be expected of men, who will not often leave their business to visit schools, or to do many of the things which are imperative if the public school is to our civilization.

J. W. MALONEY HEADS CHAUTAUQU ASSN.

Local Organization Names Men Who Will Have Charge of the County End of the Chautauqua Week.

Judge J. W. Maloney was last evening re-elected president of the local chautauqua association which takes charge of the county end of the chautauqua. County Supr. I. E. Young was elected vice president, Harold J. Warner secretary and J. T. Lambirth, treasurer. Upon motion the president, vice president and secretary were authorized to appoint all committees.

The election took place at the close of a meeting of citizens in the Commercial association rooms. J. C. Horsman, representative of the Ellison-White bureau, met with the citizens and explained something of the program this year.

He declared that the list of talent to be here this year is the highest price aggregation ever gathered together by a lyceum or chautauqua bureau. He told the citizens not to feel any doubt of the success of the institution because of the war, saying that the war has not affected the chautauqua at all so far this year. The Ellison-White talent started this year in New Orleans and will conclude Sept. 1 in Montana, visiting over 200 towns in the interim.

He urged that the local committee start an active campaign for advertising the chautauqua, which is to be here during the latter part of June.

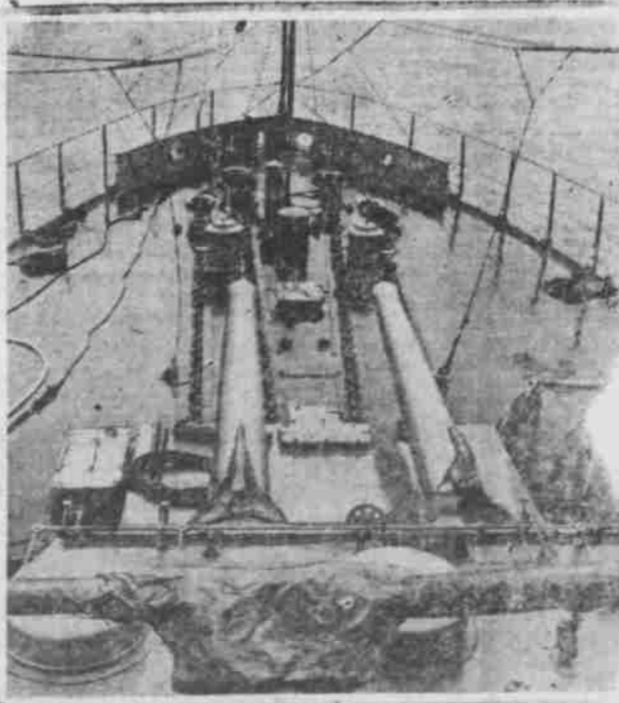
