LIVESTOCK MEN FIGHT RAISE IN FREIGHT-RATES

National Secretary Testifies Such Increase Will at Once Lower Meat Production.
 WASHINGTON, June 4.—Contending that increased freight rates would tend to thwart federal efforts at stimulating food production, representatives of Western live stock producers today protested before the interstate commerce commission against the 15 per cent increase asked by railroads.
 T. W. Tomlinson, secretary of the American National Live Stock Association, asserted that any additional freight rates will immediately show their effects in decreased meat production.
 "With the government working tooth and nail to increase the nation's food supply," he said, "it would appear to be working at cross-purposes if it adds to the cost of meat production and distribution. The average beef animal is freighted three times before being converted into meat."
 Attorneys for the railroads, in cross-examining the witness, sought to show that the difference in present proposed rates on stock would be less than the daily fluctuations in the Chicago market.
 Mr. Tomlinson presented a gloomy picture of conditions in live stock production in the intermountain regions. He said that last winter had been disastrous with the conditions the worst since 1886. The shortage of hay, he said, had sent the price of the "feeders" to nearly twice normal.

GERMANY'S SPIES MISLED AN ARMY

Their Supposed Information About Sinai Peninsula Upset by "Hard Facts."

THE HAGUE, June 6.—In an article upon the last unsuccessful Turkish-German advance across the Sinai desert to attack the Suez Canal, Paul Schneider, Imperial Ottoman War

Correspondent, makes a savage attack upon "the German professors, newspaper scribbles and bluestockings who pretend to know all about the country in the Sinai peninsula from brief trips on the Anatolian railway but whose information—upon which the German part of the expedition evidently relied heavily—turned out to be utterly misleading."

The expedition, indeed, failed apparently, from the correspondent's account, chiefly because of total ignorance of the nature of the country, the Sinai Peninsula being virtually "terra incognita," in which many unforeseen obstacles were encountered, and "the most careful calculations were upset by hard facts."

He also remarks that "we found the local Bedouins, who owed allegiance to England, most difficult to enlist in our service, and often traitors. The holy war idea left them completely cold, as they are indifferent to religion."
