# NEWS OF PENDLETON

### Heppner Lady in Hospital.

Miss Ethel Casey of Heppner, yesterday morning underwent an operation for appendicitis at St. Anthony's hospital.

### Bingham Road Open.

A telephone message to the East Oregonian from Bingham springs this morning states that the bridge above Cayuse has been replaced and that the road to Bingham via Cayuse is now open.

### Prominent Speaker Here.

### Want Money For Horse Show.

A delegation representing the Umatilla County Horse and Mile Breeders association Wednesday requested the county court for an appropriation to assist in putting on the annual show which is to be held some time in October. The court has the matter under advisement.

### Water Mains Break.

While plowing up North Main street yesterday morning preparatory to grading and paving, workmen struck water mains with their plows with the result that there were small-sized water spouts for a time. Gas mains and laterals were also broken and kept the repair men busy.

### Mother Died in California.

W. R. Anderson, Jr., of Milton was in Pendleton yesterday and left on No. 17 for Portland to meet the body of his mother who died Tuesday night at Oakland, California, where she had been taking treatment for cancer. His father, W. R. Anderson, is accompanying the body north. The deceased lady was a pioneer of Umatilla county.

### Quarter Section Brings \$20,000.

A deal was completed yesterday by W. H. Morrison whereby Louis Koecheke secures a quarter section of farm land situated about three miles southwest of Helix from Isaac Christopher for a consideration of \$20,000. The land is described as the northwest quarter of section 21, township 4 north of range 32.

### Stanfield Couple Wed.

A marriage license has been issued to J. L. Goin, 45, and Ellen Jones, 25, both of Stanfield.

### A 27 Inch Trout.

W. D. Humphrey has on exhibit in the Baum windows today a 27 inch, four pound steelhead which he hooked in McKay creek.

### Enlists in Navy.

Mrs. Mary Friedley of this city has received a letter from her son, Earl Friedley, stating that he is now in the U. S. navy and expects to sail soon. The letter was written from Philadelphia.

### Wellman Estate Appraised.

The estate of the late H. H. Wellman has been appraised at \$27,717.50 by M. O. Beauchamp, C. E. Simmonds and Lane Hoon. The estate consists of 216 acres of land valued at \$22,400 and personal property.

### Start Canvass of Votes.

County Clerk R. T. Brown, assisted by Justices of the Peace Joe H. Parker and Louis Schell, this afternoon started the official canvass of the Umatilla county vote at the special election Monday. The canvass will probably be completed by this evening.

### Conditions in Canada Good.

Crop prospects in Calgary are exceptionally good this year, according to Ralph Knight who began farming there last fall and who arrived here this morning to greet the son born to his wife yesterday. He was delayed at a dock in getting his passports from Canada.

### 85 Indians Registered.

A total of 85 Indians on the reservation registered on War Comm Day, according to Capt. E. L. Swartz, Indian, and he thinks this includes practically every male on his lists between the ages of 21 and 21. None of the Indians tried to escape registration so far as he has learned. Unless some provision is made in the future, the Indians are just as much subject to draft as white citizens.

### Argue Case To Jury.

Argument in the case of the State vs. Clark, Stanley and Walker began this afternoon, the testimony having been completed this morning. The case will probably go to the jury late this afternoon or this evening. The defendants are charged with the larceny of a calf. A great many residents of the south end of the county have been in as witnesses.

### Sheep Bridge Washed Out.

Forest Supervisor W. W. Cryder states that the sheep bridge over the John Day river at Allison's has been washed out by high water and it is impossible, at this time to state when it can be replaced. Sheepmen crossing the Umatilla forest via Ukiah route to the Whitman Forest will, therefore, have to be routed over Umatilla Driveway No. 9, via Meadow Creek and Chicken Hill. Exception to this will be made in the cases of certain sheepmen who cannot, on account of the situation of their allotments on the Whitman, take a longer route; these sheepmen will be notified of their routing.

### PORTLAND GETS SHIP YARD.

PORTLAND, June 8.—The largest wooden United States shipyard with fourteen ways, backed by a New York corporation, will be built immediately. The French government has contracted the first fifty vessels.
