THOUSANDS OF GERMANS SEEK TO ENTER RESTRICTED ZONE



NEW YORK CITY, June 8.—The drastic measures taken to keep the citizens of the nations with which we are at war away from armories, arsenals, public stores, the navy yard and other important government buildings in many cases would prevent these residents of this city from coming and going from their homes to their work.

U. S. CONSCRIPTION DEEPLY IMPRESSES THE FRENCH PEOPLE

Knowledge of American Preparation May Be Deciding Factor in Victory for the Allies, Cambon Declares

PARIS, June 7.—The French government is deeply impressed with the result of American enrollment for war," declared M. Jules Cambon, ex-foreign minister.

"Officials realize that a certain time must elapse before there is thorough cooperation with Europe. In the meanwhile they are struck with the preparations to date. Knowledge of American preparation may be the deciding factor in victory for the allies."

Cambon declared, "has demonstrated that the Russian temperament is oriental, hence easily influenced by accidental thoughts. This is the only bad feature at the Stockholm 'peace conference,' otherwise it is not important."

"France," the official orders of the day declared, "is firm in her alliances and faithful to the ideal of independence and liberty for all peoples. She desires to continue the war until the restoration of Alsace-Lorraine is accomplished; punishment for the crimes against her is obtained; reparation made for damage and guarantees against the return of the offensive by German militarism. Confidence is expressed in the senate government "which has the sole right to enter into an engagement on behalf of the nation, exercising all internal measures necessary for its safety."

Senator Robinson of Arkansas has filed a report for the committee upon the bill of Senator Calder of New York approving it.

"SAFE" EARL DAVIS HELD AS SWINDLER IN DETROIT

DETROIT, June 6.—Charged with embezzling and swindling several hundred persons on mining stocks, bonds and other schemes, Earl Davis, fifty-one years old, said to be a former captain in the United States army, was arrested today by private detectives and turned over to the Detroit police. Davis is wanted in many large cities in the United States on a charge of swindling and his operations have netted him more than \$100,000, according to local detectives.

Although Davis is middle aged, he has the appearance of a man twenty years old. He was well dressed, stood erect and smiled when the officer grabbed his arm. Without resisting, Davis walked to police headquarters.

Searched at the station, \$2,146 in cash and diamonds worth \$1,000 were found on him.

Davis gave his home as San Francisco, but the police say he is a well known figure in New York.

LIVE NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 7.—Anson Penfield Dateham of Portland, sailed from Vancouver today for the orient as an agent of the department of agriculture to find a market for fruit from the Pacific. The department is seeking a market for fruit which was formerly sold in the United Kingdom. England has placed an embargo on fruit. Dateham will first go to China and later will visit Japan, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines and eastern Siberia. The investigation will require a number of months, but he will send back to the United States such information as may be useful to Pacific coast shippers during the coming season. Dateham will remain in the most important markets through next fall and winter, assisting the shippers as far as practicable by observing the actual handling of the shipments from America. Clarence W. Moorman, in charge of the foreign market investigations of the bureau of markets of the department of agriculture made the following statement regarding Dateham's trip to the orient: "An effort will be made throughout the investigation to relate the work as clearly as possible in practical ways to the organized activities of those producers and shippers who are most interested in the market development work which is expected to follow. For this purpose Mr. Dateham and myself already have held extensive conferences with fruit shippers representing a very large percentage of the fruit shippers of California and the Pacific northwest. As the result of these conferences the specific phases of the investigation have been filled with a very definite and practical program of work. In addition to this the conferences have resulted in definite plans on the part of the shipper in taking immediate advantage of such opportunities as the investigation may reveal."

SEAPLANES TAKE HEAVY TOLL

LONDON, June 6.—British seaplanes took a heavy toll of the German aeroplane squadron which yesterday raided the English coast the admiralty statement yesterday said. Eighteen enemy aircraft were sighted off Ostend, proceeding in a north-west direction. The enemy planes were chased to England and on their return one pilot and two enemy planes were downed. Later two or three were completely destroyed, four others downed were out of control, two being considered destroyed.

German Assaults Repulsed.

PARIS, June 6.—Extremely heavy losses were inflicted on two German assaulting waves which tried vainly to reach the French lines at Hartebise, the statement said.

Heavy Damage at Ostend.

LONDON, June 6.—Yesterday's bombardment inflicted vast damage on the German naval depot at Ostend, the admiralty statement said. Photo reconnaissance shows a majority of the workshops destroyed or seriously damaged. The entrance gates to the dockyards, the submarine base, the shelter and a destroyer under repair were badly damaged. Several vessels were sunk.

London, June 6.—Haig has swung the British columns forward and renewed the offensive.

"North of the Scarpe we further progressed on the western slopes of Greenland Hill," the statement said. "West of Loos we gained ground slightly." The report indicated progress in enveloping Lens.

TORNADO TAKES TOLL OF 32 DEAD, 200 HURT

Property Damage is Estimated at From Two to Three Million Dollars.

CHICAGO, June 7.—Thirty-two are known dead and 200 injured as the result of tornadoes sweeping four states Tuesday night and yesterday. The property damage is estimated at from two to three million dollars.

FRENCH AVIATOR FEELS 2 MACHINES IN A MINUTE

Capt. Guynemer's Toll for Day Was Five—32 Airplanes Destroyed in Two Weeks.

PARIS, June 5.—The following official account of aerial activities was given out here today: "In the period between May 17 and May 21, 32 German machines were destroyed on our front during aerial combats, in addition to 57 others which were damaged seriously and probably crashed to earth within the enemy lines. Capt. Guynemer brought down five machines, four of them on the same day. Two of these airplanes were killed in one minute, which is, perhaps, the first time in the war that such a thing has been accomplished. These five new victories bring up to 42 the number of German machines destroyed thus far by this valiant officer.

"In the same period Lieut. Pinaud put out of action three German machines, triumphing over his fifteenth adversary. Here are the names of other pilots who have increased the number of their exploits: Adjutant Madon, 12 machines; Substitute-Lieutenant Tarascon, 11; Adjutant Jallier, 10; Capt. Mitton, 6; Serat Soullier, 5."

U. S. HOSPITAL SHIP FILTHY, TARS SAVED

Senate Orders Probe of Conditions Aboard Solace.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A protest from 20 sailors against alleged cruel treatment, neglect, bad food, and insanitary conditions aboard the naval hospital ship Solace was presented to the senate today by Senator Calder of New York, with a request for investigation. It was referred to the naval committee.

The sailors charged that when suffering high fever they were compelled to carry their own kites, that dishes were washed in the lavatories, that food was served to many sick men on one song platter and that men unable to bathe themselves went unwashed.

Surgeon General Crockett of the navy has referred the complaint to Rear Admiral Mayo, commander of the Atlantic fleet, for investigation and report. General Crockett said the sailors may have been crowded with patients for a few hours on some recent trip, but that no insubordinate conditions nor careless washing of utensils ever was permitted on the hospital ship.
