BUTTE. June 9.—Thirty-five bodies were recovered from the blazing Speculator mine this morning. The fire which has been razing in the mine since midnight, began when a high voltage wire ignited tar in the twenty-four hundred foot level. The fire spread quickly and spread burning gases to the adoining Blamond mine. Four BUTTE, June 9,-Thirty-five poining Blamond mine. Four-bundred and fifteen men were working in the speculator mine when the fire broke out. Two hundred and thirteen escaped through connecting levels adjoin-ing the shafts, leaving 167 unac-vanued on. There is little bope

When the fire prevented escape from the lower levels between 40 and 50 men managed to escape by working their way through the pitch darkness of underground passages into the Radree mine, adjoining, coming out through the shaft.

Scenes about the opening of the mine are heartrending. Groups of women and children stood outside the gates of the mine while research worked. It is believed the disaster is the greatest mine disaster in the west. The total dead is expected to be between 100 and 150.
